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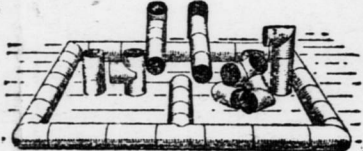

By the beginning of March he had made up five minutes of his loss, and before the month is over he will have caught up to within five minutes of the schedule, meanwhile the days have been growing longer very rapidly. We begin March with our nights longer than our days. We end it with our days longer than our nights. In the one month we have added to the length of our day an hour and twenty minutes, a bigger gain than any other month can show.—Professor C. S. Schmucker, in the March Ladies' Home Journal.
