Saturday's Fire.

On last Saturday about 1:30 p. m. it was discovered that the Free Will Baptist church, the upper part of which was used by the Mason's as a lodge room, was on fire. The blaze was a very incipient one when discovered and could it have been reached, could have been easily extinguished; but being on the roof of a two-story building and no fire department or water works available, the people were forced to stand by and see the building destroyed.

Fortunately the Mason's were in their Hall at the time and thus were enabled to save all their furniture and regalia. The property of the church below was also saved.

The fire is thought to have originated from a small fire built in the Mason's Hall but a few minutes before the fire on the roof was discovered.

'Twas only by the heroic work of the citizens aided by the gallant efforts of the country people who happened to be in town, that neighboring residences of Messrs. P. C. Setzer and V. L. Stephens were saved. Had they caught it is more than probable that the business portion of the town would have been swept away.

Mr. Asberry M. Pittman, Dead.

On the morning of the 19th of April, 1902, the dark-winged Messenger again visited our town, and bore hence to its eternal reward the soul of Mr. Asberry M. Pittman, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Pittman, and brother of Mrs. J. W. Lane and Mr. J. P. Pittman, former editor of THE BANNER, of our town, also brother of Mr. S. S. Pittman, of Richmond, Va.

At the time of his death, Mr. Pittman was in the forty-first year of his age. Eleven years prior thereto he was married to Miss Mamie Ford, of Warrenton, N. C., who, with four small children, survive him.

We cannot explain the mysteries of God's dealings; we cannot understand why the husband, father and friend has been called away at the very zenith of life and in the very zenith of manhood's strength; we cannot, by words of sympathy, dispel the dark shadows which have been made to gather around that home, and yet through the rift of the cloud the bright ray of a silver lining appears, as we are assured that early in life, our departed friend placed his trust where confidence is not betrayed, and laid up his treasures where thieves may not despoil nor rust corrode.

For many years, Mr. Pittman had been a devoted member of the Missionary Baptist church. Quiet and unpretentious in his nature, he yet preached the silent, but eloquent sermon of a Christian life. We, therefore, bid the loved ones who have been separated from him for a while, to "sorrow not as those who have no hope;" he is not dead but has fallen asleep in Him whom he trusted in life and whose rod and staff supported him through the dark valley.
