Senatorial Convention.

Mr. H. B. Chesnut called the convention to order at 11:30 o'clock and asked Mr. Jas. A. Wellons to act as temporary chairman, and T. H. McNeill as secretary. Upon motion the temporary organization was made permanent. All members of the Democratic press were asked to act as secretaries.

The following gentlemen were elected an executive committee, viz: H. B. Chestnut, of Sampson, W. A. Stewart, of Harnett, and J. T. Ellington, of Johnston. Mr. Chestnut was re-elected chairman of the committee.

Upon motion by Mr. J. C. Clifford, the convention proceeded to nominate candidates for the Senate.

Mr. John A. Naron, of Smithfield, in a few appropriate words placed Hon. C. W. Richardson, of Johnston county in nomination for the Senate, and Mr. H. A. Grady, of Sampson, placed the name of Hon. H. L. Godwin in nomination for the Senate. Mr. Naron in an eloquent and able manner.

Mr. M. F. Hatcher, one of Dunn's young attorneys, seconded the nomination of Mr. Richardson in a very pleasing manner. Mr. W. W. Cole, one of Smithfield's able lawyers, in a few well-chosen words seconded the nomination of Mr. Godwin. There being no other nominations it was moved that these two gentlemen be nominated by acclamation, and without a dissenting voice, they were nominated by acclamation.

Mr. Richardson was called upon and in a short but able speech accepted the nomination and promised the people of this district that nothing would be left undone that would benefit his people.

Mr. Godwin responded to a call in a manner that characterized him as an ideal man for the Senate. He also promised the people of the three counties to leave no stone unturned that would aid them in any way.

In the nomination of these two gentlemen the convention made no mistake. They are both loyal Democrats and will girdle the whole armor of Democracy about them and go into this campaign with renewed energy and fight unceasingly for the cause of their party. The district should feel proud that such men as these have been placed on their ticket. For with them in the Senate they have nothing to fear. They will ever be watchful, and look after our interests.

Hon. E. W. Pou, one of North Carolina's able Congressmen, made an able and eloquent speech showing why it was necessary for the standard bearers of democracy to go into the fight again as they have for years past, as they had the same enemy to meet, but with a new face. He discussed in a short measure national politics, referring to his trip to Maine by saying the people there were thoroughly aroused on the political issues that confront the people now. Mr. Pou has a commanding appearance and a flow of language with which he can hold an audience spell-bound for hours. Johnston county should feel proud that she has such a man within her borders.

After Mr. Pou's speech Mr. Mr. Clifford offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Be it resolved by the Democratic Convention of the 15th Senatorial district, that in view of the relative Democratic strength of the respective counties composing this, the 15th Senatorial district, it is the sense of this convention that the county of Johnston is entitled to one Senator each term and that the counties of Harnett and Sampson alternate each succeeding term in the selection of the other Senator to which the district is entitled.

Resolved, further, that in the future, as it has this day, this convention endorse the candidate selected by the county convention of the county entitled to name the Senatorial candidate.

After the adoption of this resolution the convention adjourned, each man promising that he would do all in his power to roll up a big majority at the November election.

Republican Convention.

The Republican convention was pulled off at Greensboro last week. Boss Pritchard and his followers held a lively circus. The strong feature of the convention was the endorsement of Thos. N. Hill, of Halifax county, for Chief Justice. Mr. Hill has heretofore been considered a democrat, but the sight of office—a sight is all he can ever obtain, caused him to proselyte, to leave the party of the people, the party which at all times and under all circumstances since its organization by the great friend of the masses of the people, Thomas Jefferson, has stood for the government by the people. This party has been abandoned by him, and he, like Billy Day and Fabius H. Busbee, has gone horse and dragon into the Republican party.

Another indication of the said convention points clearly to the fact that the efforts of the Republicans in this campaign will be to secure the Legislature and elect Senator Pritchard to the United States Senate again next winter.

A prominent man in the town of Dunn stated to us a few days ago that he had been offered money and a good sum, to run for the Legislature in this county as an Independent. They hope to get enough independents in the field to so divide the party that the Democrats cannot poll their strength, and thereby let the Republican candidate or such independents as will promise to vote for Pritchard and Hannah will not spare the bootie to put independents in the field. When you see or hear of such independents, be sure you investigate the influences that caused his independentism, and we predict that when you do that something along the line suggested above will be revealed.

Why should a Democrat now turn radical? Is it because the Democratic party has eliminated the negro and made it impossible for had government again in the State? If that be so, then why not stand by the party that made these things possible. The Republicans of this State have inaugurated a policy to distintegrate the Democratic party of the State and they will not be scrupulous as to the methods employed to carry out this campaign. One method is to advocate independence on the part of the Democratic voters. When you hear this kind of talk you can at once spot Pritchard and his cohorts as the originators.

Mr. E. R. McKethan Candidate

Mr. E. R. McKethan has announced himself an independent candidate for congress in the Sixth Congressional district. Mr. McKethan was a member of the last General Assembly. The Wilmington Messenger has a very sensible editorial on this action which we give below:

The Messenger, along with many other friends of Mr. E. R. McKethan, of Fayetteville, is grieved to hear that he has kicked out of Democratic traces and declared himself an independent candidate for congress against the nominee of the party with which he has heretofore affiliated and in whose service he has done such valiant work. Mr. McKethan, we suppose, is still a supporter of the principles advocated by the Democratic party. As far as his political tenets are concerned he is still a Democrat; but simply because a man he desired the Democrats to nominate for this office failed in securing the coveted honor, he feels justified bolting the party nomination and declaring himself an independent candidate—for what purpose? To aid in electing a Republican to congress from this district. We say to aid in electing a Republican congress man, because he is well acquainted with political status of this district and so knows that between himself and the Democratic nominee, even with a third man in the field, there can be but one result—his ignominious defeat; therefore his candidacy can do nothing but draw from Mr. Patterson the support of democrats who are willing in order to "get even" with Mr. Patterson for defating their convention to jeopardize the Democratic cause in this district.

It will not be long before Mr. McKethan will deeply regret his action in this matter. He will find that it has worked great injury to himself, and what, in our estimation of the man's character, will be of greater grief to him, he will find that he has helped to blight the political prospects of a friend whom he so loyally supported for the nomination in the convention at Fayetteville. The public will be quick to come to the conclusion that this unfortunate move by Mr. McKethan was made with the full knowledge and consent of a defeated candidate at that convention, but who was not willing himself to assume the attitude of an opponent of the democratic nominee.

We predict that Mr. McKethan's candidacy will be short-lived. For his sake and the sake of the party we hope it will be; but in the mean time he has done great harm politically to himself and to the friend whom he supported in the Fayetteville convention.

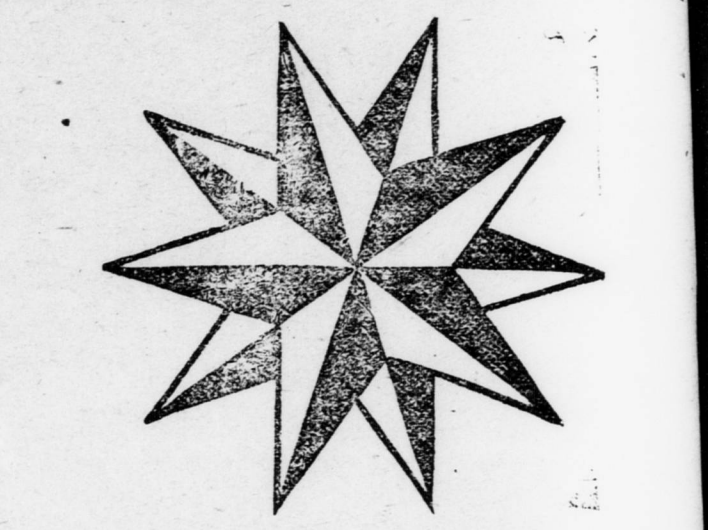
