Farmers, Hold Your Cotton.

Mr. Editor:

With war clouds hanging heavily over nearly the entire civilized world, causing almost complete demoralization of commerce as well as serious financial embarrassments the most stubborn problem that confronts us of the cotton belt is the profitable disposition of this year's crop.

Just now the buyers as well as the growers are from present indications completely at sea as to the proper method to pursue. There are and will be any number of plans and projects turned loose on the general public, most of which will prove, as I believe, of no avail. They may be all-right in principle but not feasible or available just at this time.

While I am not presuming to act as adviser to the people generally not being capable of that, I will say this: That I believe where it is possible for him to do so, that each individual farmer should hold his own cotton in the seed, most planters are prepared to safely house all they grow and if not can easily get prepared. This will certainly hold the crop off the market and out of the hands of speculators, and I believe have a decided tendency toward strengthening the market not only as to lint but the seed as well.

Let every grower that is prepared hold and let the stronger help the week. Mark the prediction. Cotton is going up after it leaves the grower's hands. There was no more excuse for cotton taking such an abrupt fall than for sugar taking such an abrupt rise. As to the alleged tightness of the money market and the timidity of banks and individuals in making loans it is no more than we might have reasonably expected. After a storm there is always a calm, and we have had the storm. Yes a storm of overtrading at fictitious prices, based credit; of debt and bonds of every kind and class, of high living and a general mania for extravagance in every direction.

There is an end to all things and the end of this wild cat financing I believe is close at hand. It simply means that the world has waked up to the fact that its time to settle up. Many of us if we settle at all will have to resort to the popular practice, sell bonds in time of peace and the bond market is about as shaky as the cotton market.

In other words we will have to find the indebtedness, borrow money to pay it and if it turns out there is nobody to loan to us in the language of Flanagan of Texas, "Where are we at?"

But all dangers are not death and to every cloud I see a silver lining, and no doubt these diffi-

culties and perhaps disasters into which we have seemingly plunged will be one of our strongest assets in the future. Perhaps it will teach us some hard lessons we will not soon forget,—teach the importance of practicing economy before we have to.
