North Carolina Day At Beech Fork.

News Items From Beech Fork.

Mr. W. T. Perry made a business trip to Norfolk last week.

Mr. G. L. Davenport, Mr. and Mrs. Miller and children, Mrs. Broderick of Norfolk, Misses Sophia and Annie Wood, Messrs. Alma Forehand and John Wood, Jr., of Edenton were visitors at Mr. W. T. Perry's Sunday afternoon.

Mr. Branning Perry is serving as a juror in the December term of court which convened in Edenton Monday.

Notwithstanding the inclement weather, quite a number of friends, together with the students of the school gathered at Beech Fork on Friday Dec. 4, to celebrate North Carolina Day.

On Thursday quite a number of the men of the community went out to the school and they, with the teachers and students, each one doing his or her part, made many improvements around the building both inside and out a notable feature of which was the formation of a baseball ground for the school team. The house was decorated in autumn leaves and pine boughs and everything was put in readiness for the following day.

On Friday the audience was delightfully entertained with music by the Rocky Hock brass band until the speakers of the day, Ex-Senator O. S. Vann, Mr. W. J. Berryman, a member of the Board of Education, and Supt. J. O. Alderman should arrive from Edenton. At the beginning of the morning program the students of the school sang the "Morning Hymn," which was followed by devotional exercises led by Mr. Alderman. Mr. W. T. Perry, chairman of the school committee gave a few words of welcome and then introduced Ex-Senator Vann. In the remarks that Mr. Vann made he compared the Roman methods of improvement to ours of today and said that good roads and good school buildings should be some of the first improvements. He also compared the old one-room school building at Beech Fork to the handsome four room building of today, and said that when such buildings are erected, it is a

sufficient proof of the fact that better buildings are for the betterment of the community. These remarks were worthy of the consideration of us all. Following these remarks a summary of the rural survey questions was read and a brief discussion of these followed, which was led by Mr. Alderman. The band then gathered in front of the building and furnished music while the children gathered on each side and then marched up and took their places in the form of a semi circle just in front of the building, the first grade leading in the march. The school then sang "America" after which Mr. Berryman in an interesting and impressive manner presented a United States flag, which was then waving in great splendor, to the school. The students of the higher grades then sang "Red White and Blue." During the intermission which followed much enjoyment was manifested, when the ladies of the community spread their lunch which they had so willingly prepared for the occasion. And not alone in eating was this period of intermission enjoyed but also in observing the close game of ball which the school boys played. At 2:30 o'clock the crowd again assembled in the auditorium, and after the song "Carolina," Mr. Berryman made a very appropriate speech. He, too, spoke of the prosperity of a community being manifested by the erection of good school buildings, and how largely the people are dependent upon rural communities. "The boys of today are the men of tomorrow," he said, "and perhaps some of the leading men of tomorrow will be the boys who are now studying at Beech Fork school." But he also told the boys that along with their learning, they must learn to love the farm or the rural communities of the state, and in fact this whole "North State" of ours. As a response to this, the students arose and gave the toast to Carolina and sang "Hail, For Carolina." After a few other brief discussions the audience was dismissed by Mr. Alderman.

This was a big day for Beech Fork, and we hope that the inspiring messages brought to the hearers by these notable men will cause them to continue to rally to the cause of education, and make this school one of the leading rural schools of the state.

The school this year has as its teachers Miss Mary Newby White of Belvidere as principal and Misses Annie Bush of Tyner and Lillian Barbour of Smithfield, N. C., as assistants.
