During the past year we increased the library of the school, spending seventy dollars in new books.

The library was divided into three sections—Primary, Intermediate and High School. Books were distributed in ratio of 3 plus 2 plus 1, this being adhered to in the number of books and amount of money paid for them. To accommodate this division we had cases built in the lower hall in places that were lost space to us before.

The High School supplementary reading has been placed on the rental basis. Each pupil is required to read six books, required by the college entrance requirements, and to write an outline of said book. These books vary in price from 25c to \$1.50 the nominal sum of 25c for each pupil will cancel the cost of the books in two years. This is a saving to each pupil from \$1.25 to \$2.50 per year.

During the year, we gave High School spelling test, prepared by U. of N. C. Ed. Department. We find our pupils taking no mean rank with an average for Edenton of 86 vs. average for State of 79.

We are giving the Courtis tests in Arithmetic in the Grammar grades by which we can measure the teachers' worth and pupils' progress from time to time in the fundamental operations.

The Board leaves the compulsory age limit the same as last year, viz. 8 to 12.

The first four months of school will be the compulsory attendance period. School will open on September 20th, 1915.
