That we should have a Railroad Commission.

That no State official or legislator should be allowed to receive railroads with free tickets or free passes.

That the jurisdiction of Magistrates should be enlarged.

That the homestead law should be so modified as to make it a blessing and not a curse to the poor people of the State.

That the farmers of North Carolina and of the South are in a more depressed condition than ever before, and that their condition is growing worse every year.

ALLIANCE RESOLUTIONS.

[Continued from the Progressive Farmer.]

Catawba Creek Alliance, No. 636, have resolved that they will buy no guano this year unless it can be procured through Alliance Agents.

Main View Alliance, Franklin county, resolved that they will use no commercial fertilizer on corn or cotton if the price is higher than it was in 1888.

Spring Hill Alliance, of Sampson county, by a unanimous vote, decided to buy no guano except through Alliance Agents.

Woodall's Alliance, Davie county, has endorsed the demands of the State Alliance in regard to increased jurisdiction of justices of the peace, convict labor, and free passes on railroads.

Invie County Alliance endorsed unconditionally the demands of the State Alliance upon the Legislature, in regard to giving convict labor, public officials accepting free passes over railroads, &c.

At a meeting of Buffalo Ford Alliance, Randolph county, after endorsing the demand of the State Alliance, a resolution was adopted to amend the school law so as to require the teaching of the elementary principles of the science of agriculture in our common schools.

Morgan Hill Alliance, of Buncombe county, by resolution, instructed their members of the Legislature to use their influence to procure the construction of a line of railroad from Asheville to Cranberry; also, to use their best endeavors to have the public highways worked by taxation.

At a regular meeting of Moore Hill Alliance, Moore county, the demands of the State Alliance were unanimously endorsed. A resolution was also adopted, asking the Legislature to enact such a law as will compel railroads running through Moore county to pay full value for all damage done to live stock.

The Jones County Alliance, considering the homestead law, the present of the present homestead system, and that it has a tendency to drive capital and manufacturing enterprises from the State, resolved to ask its repeal at the hands of the present Legislature.

Dry Creek Alliance, of Chatham county, memorializes the General Assembly of North Carolina to amend the present school law so that each county shall appropriate not less than one dollar per scholar, and that the money be paid direct from the Sheriff to the school committee of each district, the committee to give a sufficient bond for the security of said money.

Rockfish Alliance, of Duplin county, protested against the coining of alighted laborers of this State to other States to work, leaving their children behind to be schooled, and the old and infirm to be taken care of, and requested the Legislature to enact a law to remedy the evil; they further ask that persons convicted of crime who are unable to pay costs and fine be required to work out the same on the roads, instead of being confined in jail at the expense of the taxpayers, further that all able-bodied unemployed tax-payers be required to work out the amount of their taxes on the public roads.

At a meeting of Brassfield Alliance, Granville county, a series of resolutions were adopted declaring it to be their purpose to purchase no fertilizer from any individual or company who refuse to sell their goods through Alliance Agents; that they will not buy from any fertilizer company that is or has been in any manner connected with a trust, which has for its object the advancing of the price of guano; that they will hereafter bestow their patronage upon honest North Carolina companies, and other Southern manufacturers, so long as they steer clear of trusts, and deal fairly with Alliance Agents and endorse the bold and patriotic stand taken by the States in regard to a railroad commission, &c., in his recent message.

MAJORITY OF VOTES.

Senator Williams, of Pitt, has introduced the following important bill in the Legislature:

A Bill to be Entitled An Act to Prevent the Buying and Selling of "Futures."

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That the buying and selling of options and contracts for the future sale or delivery of any cotton, corn, wheat, oats, rye, meat or lard, shall be unlawful, unless the price for which said articles, or any of them, are to be delivered shall be paid to the seller by the purchaser at the time of the consummation of the said contract.

Sec. 2. That every debt (in whatever form, bond, note or account) made or contracted in the sale for future delivery of any of the products or articles mentioned in section one hereof, and every debt, note, bond or account arising out of any such contract of trade, shall be utterly void and non-collectible by the laws of this State.

Sec. 3. That all sales, agreements, or contracts whereby one person acquires a right to buy, or a right not to buy, at or before a certain day, at a certain price, any of the products mentioned in section one of this act, shall be unlawful and void, and all debts contracted in such transactions, or arising directly therefrom, shall be void and non-collectible.

Sec. 4. This act shall be in force from and after first day of May, 1889.
