CONNELL'S RETURN.

The Departing ex-Clerk of Fredell Superior Court at Home.

Statesville Landmark.

"Tuesday evening's train from Charlotte brought a surprise to the people of Statesville. J. B. Connolly, the defaulting ex-clerk of the Superior Court, arrived on it, with his wife and youngest child. They took a carriage at the station and were driven to the residence of O. M. Connelly, on Front street, and yesterday Connolly was on the streets shaking hands with his acquaintances. He does not look as well as when he left and says his health has not been the same but his spirits are fairly good and his confidence in his own integrity is unshaken. He said on the train, on his way up, that he was neither ashamed nor afraid to face his enemies. It was supposed, when it was learned that he was in town, that he would be at once arrested, but Sheriff Allison was in the country Tuesday night and yesterday and so he was not disturbed. The sheriff is in town this morning but no steps had been taken in the case up to 11 o'clock. Ex-Judge Montgomery, of Concord and ex-Solicitor Adams, of Asheville, were here last Saturday having been retained in Connolly's interest, to ascertain of Solicitor Long what bond would probably be required in case of his return, and it is believed that the return of the fugitive is a result of the visit and in pursuance of the advice of this counsel."
