The strong, half tamed young Russian is running a fair race with the Anglo-Saxon for the conquest of the Orient. A railroad has been projected from St. Petersburg through Siberia to Shanghai. It is already partly built, and will be one of the most stupendous engineering works of modern times. When finished passengers will be able to travel from London to Shanghai in twenty-two days. It now requires thirty to thirtyfive days.

The Russian part of this great iron

girdle round two continents will cost not less than \$500,000,000. The money has already been subscribed to build it, four times over. It was borrowed in France. Railroads in Russia are built by the government. From St. Petersburg to Shanghia is a distance 6,630 miles. A railroad more than 6,000 miles long is A railroad more than 6,000 miles long is something to make even an American open his eyes. Over 1,000 miles of this road is already built from Moscow to Nijni Novgorod. The rest will certainly follow. The best engineers of Europe have been surveying and planning the line for the past lifteen years.

The purpose of the road is partly military, partly civil. If England and Russia should ever try conclusions by force in

should ever try conclusions by force in Asia, this railway would give Russia great advantages for the mobilization of troops. The second object of the road is transportation of freight and passengers. In this second view of the case, America has an interest more or less direct. Si-beria is not the waste of snow covered sand that it has been commonly depicted. Fully two-thirds can be transformed into excellent wheat lands. A railroad once built through its lonely steppes, and the trains that carried prisoners to the Siberian mines would return laden with wheat to feed Europe.
