Wiley After a Cousinship.  
Mr. Cicero Harris writing to the Durham Tobacco Plant, has the following to say concerning J. Wiley Shook, Esq., the well-known Republican editor and politician of this district:

"A magnificent specimen of manhood, tall, broad-shouldered and deep-chested, strode into the library shortly before noon accompanied by a spruce, active man, who, although he was of fully average size, was no taller than his companion's collar.  
The big man was Editor J. W. Shook, and the Clyde Register, which he owns and edits, is the only Republican paper in Western North Carolina. The rather dapper-looking gentleman with him was Representative H. G. Ewart, who will look out for the interests of the ninth North Carolina district in the next Congress. He represents the only district in the State in which there is a working majority of wise Republicans. Ewart thinks that editor Shook would make a first class consul, and Mr. Shook has expressed a preference for a position of that kind in Japan."

An Asheville Boy Will Be There.  
The Robert Pulliam Johnston mentioned in the subjoined paragraph is a resident of this city, and a son of Capt. Robert B. Johnston. Young Mr. Johnston, who is also nephew of ex-Congressman Thos. D. Johnston, is an unusually intelligent and scholarly gentleman, and will reflect great credit upon his town, county and district at the great war training school of the nation.  
"The following young men will report at West Point, June the 14th, to stand the entrance examination at the U. S. Military Academy: Geo. Pierce Howell, 3d district; John F. Phifer, 8th district; Solomon C. Pool, 4th district; Wilbur F. Cross, 1st district; James S. Battie, 2d district; Robt. Pulliam Johnston, 9th district. There will be a vacancy in the U. S. Military Academy in the 5th district in 1891 and one each in the 6th and 7th in 1892."

No Freight on Sunday.  
DETROIT, Mich., April 23.—The Michigan Central railroad will hereafter run no freight trains on Sunday except when absolutely necessary for the conveyance of perishable goods and live stock. All other trains will be stopped at 6 p. m. Saturday and will not start before 6 a. m. Monday. President LeMay said this morning that the company had been considering this matter for a long time and finally determined to make the experiment. It will reduce the Sunday freight business one-half and give a large number of employes one day's rest in seven. Under the present system, he said, were in favor of Sunday as a day of rest.

Fight Over the State Line.  
NASHVILLE, April 25.—A special to the Banner from Bristol says that an agreement has been effected that will prevent any collision between Tennessee and Virginia officers on account of the undetermined location of the State line. Yesterday morning countrymen armed with shotguns and pistols gathered from every direction and when one of the leading lawyers for Virginia advised that men be put to work to locate the line, they shot down if he touched one of them. It looked as if bloodshed was unavoidable. Injunction cases and processes for contempt will remain in statu quo, to be fought in the courts.

Forget His Orders.  
CINCINNATI, April 25.—A dispatch from Glenmary, Tenn., says a collision occurred there yesterday between two freight trains on the Cincinnati Southern road, as a result of forgetfulness of the engineer of one of them. The collision occurred a mile south of Glenmary. Brakemen Taylor, conductor Hinman and engineer Euk were badly crushed. The first two died soon after being extricated. Euk's injuries are fatal. Two others were slightly injured.

Death of a Leading Minister.  
HARRISBURG, Va., April 25.—Rev. L. C. Miller a prominent minister of the M. E. church, South, died here this morning. He was very popular and greatly beloved. He had been retired some time ago on account of ill health. He was one of the most eloquent preachers in the South.
