A CARD.
To the Editor of The Citizen: Will you please publish a reply to Max Lindsey's article in the issue of the 28th of April. The facts in the case are: I started yesterday to Mr. Lindsey's part of the city to get a man on the street. Republican ticket, as that part of the city had been left out, had started out to see another in his neighborhood that was willing to put on the ticket. I overtook Mr. Lindsey and asked him to get in and ride with me, which he did. I then told him that I wanted a man from Doubleday on the Republican ticket and I asked him if he would allow his name to go on the ticket. He told me to put his name on it, which I did, and after explaining who would be on the ticket, I then turned around and came back to the street. To my surprise, after I came back from dinner one of Mr. Lindsey's sons came to me very much agitated and wanted to know why I had put his father's name on the ticket. I told him then and there that I did it with his father's consent and would prove to him that his father had given his consent to go on the ticket. So we went together to his father's place of business, but we could not find him. Hence Mr. Lindsey's card denying even being a Republican and a third party man, and declaring that he was a Sumner man, and that he has a right to be.
