KNIGHTS OF HONOR.
Election of Supreme Officers at Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 16.—The third day session of the Supreme Lodge, Knights of Honor, was devoted to the hearing of reports from the committees and the election of officers. The election resulted as follows: Supreme dictator, A. R. Savage, Lewiston, Me.; supreme vice dictator, Samuel Klotz, Newark, N. J.; supreme assistant dictator, Hon. Marsden Bellamy, Wilmington, N. C.; supreme reporter, D. P. Nelson, St. Louis; supreme promoter, J. W. Branch, St. Louis; supreme trustee, P. A. Remington, Philadelphia; Judge O'Key Johnston, of West Virginia, and E. R. Bacon, Eatont, S. C. In the afternoon the contested seat of Jacob Hough, of Jacksonville, Fla., was taken up and finally disposed of by Hough being admitted. It was claimed by some of the supreme officers that Hough's election was illegal.

Storm in Iowa.
BURLINGTON, Ia., May 16.—A heavy rain storm struck the city yesterday morning and continued for two hours. A wild storm followed which unroofed two business houses while barns and other buildings were moved from their foundations and trees and fences blown down. The aggregate damage is considerable though individual losses are not heavy. The rain was of much benefit to the crops.

Iron Workers Strike.
PITTSBURG, Pa., May 16.—Employees of the National Tube Works Company, at McKeesport, Pa., tried to-day for an advance in wages of 10 per cent. Two thousand men are out. Employees of the galvanizing and rolling departments also threaten to join the strikers. About 6,000 men are employed in this plant.

A Message From the Sea.
CHARLESTON, May 16.—Capt. Morris of the British Schooner, Galena, which arrived at Charleston from New York to-day reports that when off Frying Pan shoals, a carrier pigeon flew on board. On one leg was a rubber band with 83 stamped on it. No vessel was in sight at the time. The pigeon was brought to Charleston.

They Want Union Wages.
PITTSBURG, Pa., May 16.—The employees of the Solar Iron Works recently joined the Amalgamated association of iron and steel workers, and to-day struck in wages of 10 per cent.
