Thirty Feet Down a Well.

While Mr. Pierce Bass was drawing water at the well last Sunday his four-year old daughter was leaning against the box which had been removed the week before for cleaning out the well and had not been fastened. As Mr. Bass leaned to pour the water from the well bucket the box fell over leaving an opening into which the child pitched head foremost about thirty feet into the well. The well is thirty-six feet deep and has five or six feet of water coming near the top of the rock wall. The child struck the wall and had a severe cut on the back of her head and neck. It seems miraculous that she was not killed. Her father called to her to catch the well rope which she did and held until he went down and got hold of her. She is doing well, but had a narrow escape from death.

SLAUGHTERING WOLVES.

An Old Time Hunt in Macon County After the Yarnalis.
Atlanta Constitution.
CLAYTON, Ga., May 29.—A large number of men from this county and from Macon county, N. C., met on the Mount Airy about a week ago for the purpose of killing wolves. Thursday night came and passed, and no trace was had of the wolves except one wolf was heard to howl on the Pinnacle Thursday night by Henderson Daily and others, which caused them to return at once to the camp.

Friday morning was clear, and the drivers, with their equipment, hounds and guns, marched in single file toward the place where the wolf was heard to howl. Soon they reached the place, and every effort was made to raise the desired animal, but only a cold trail could be had. Slowly, but surely they followed its trail till late in the afternoon, with no success. Here some of the party, getting worried at not finding the wolves as numerous as they had imagined, returned home, leaving hunters yet in the woods.

After consulting the foreman, Jasper Hopper, who was an old and experienced hunter, in regard to wolves at this season of the year, it was decided the hunters arrange themselves in parties of about three or four in various places on the mountains and learn from the howling the whereabouts of these wolves. The plan put the pursuers in possession of the idea as to where the cunning wolves were.

Next morning at five o'clock the signal gun was fired by C. F. Garland for every stander to go to his stand in double quick time. After sufficient time was allowed for all to get to their stands the drivers shouldered their arms, and, being led by the foreman, made their way toward the mountain side laurel, the place where the wolves had their den. They reached the place very soon and loosing all dogs, bidding each dog and forth through the high-on. Everything was as still as a graveyard for a few minutes. All at once the hounds, closely followed by their masters, were upon the den of wolves.

Here for some time no description can be given of the fight. Men were howling at the tops of their voices, and dogs howling for life. After a while the men reached the den where the dogs and wolves had just ended one of the most terrible fights on record between dogs and wolves. Although the fight was a rough one, only one dog was killed and two wounded. "Now for the young ones," said one. John Bradley, being the first to get to the den, laid off his shot pouch and crawled in to where the little ones were. Soon he counted out seven, all males but one, thought to be about a week old. Meanwhile the hounds the old ones barked and forth through the laurel. Soon the report of a shot gun was heard that would have shaken the walls of Jericho, which only seemed to give courage to the dogs. Shortly after the report of a rifle was heard to mix with the yelping of the hounds up the laurel, which was a fatal shot fired by Mr. Nichols, almost instantly killing one of the largest wolves ever seen by the hunters present. Just how many old ones there were is not known, but there were certainly three.
