IN MEMORIAM.  
If a philanthropic spirit, kindness of heart, integrity and honesty ever composed a true goodness, a great man has fallen in Israel. Died at his country home (Beal Pleasant) near this city, on the 29th of April last, Frank Rollins, formerly a citizen of Western North Carolina.  
We fit no shadows, and no man can annex the morrow to his existence; yet in the brief period allotted us here, we make such records among our fellow mortals as embody the memory of those before in words and acts of kindness and love, or allow the earth that covers us to act as a mantle of charity in obscuring forever those deeds done in the flesh of which no man speaks well, and are best forgotten.  
Frankley Rollins loved his fellow man. His hand was ever ready in the friendly grasp of recognition, for none were too high or too low in the social scale to enjoy his friendship and his heart always throbbing with sympathetic impulse at the sight of distress or receipt of woe. No conflicting interests or contending passions were allowed to mar his love; he bore no ill will, and the sun never went down on his wrath. A devoted father and husband, an affectionate son and brother, a kind neighbor and a good citizen. With such a glorious tablet in the hearts of all who knew him, how feeble is a friend's eulogy, how useless a proud marble shaft to record his epitaph and commemorate his virtues.  
Should not the year of one who had thrown so much sunshine into life and strewn the pathway of others with flowers pass to the paper files with that ease and comfort with which the confiding soul beholds this dissolving empire of earth? Surely! Such is not the lesson of Calvary; but the good, the kind, and the gentle, are often marked for the most intense suffering. That the fullness of manhood he was prostrated by that most insidious of all diseases, cancer, and for seventeen months he watched and noted its slow but unflinching advance, which he knew could only terminate fatally. What he suffered only his family and a few near friends knew; it was agony, long drawn out, and Disease, as if appalled with its own ravages, granted a three days' respite, and he passed away gently as a babe falls to sleep in his mother's arms, and his generous spirit ascended to the bosom of his Father and his God.  
"The gentle air came through the open window Laden with the odors of the early Spring; He breathed it not. The laugh of passers-by tarred like discord in some musical tune; But awakened not his slumbers—he was dead."  
His body rests in a little copse adjoining an orchard. Here, as the year rolls by, on each recurring anniversary of his death the violets and the apple blossoms will wait their perfume on his grave, and the wild birds will sing his requiem.
