General News Dead.  
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—General A. C. Myers, late quartermaster general of the Confederate army, died at his residence here this morning. He was a native of South Carolina, graduated at West Point in 1833, served in the Fourth United States Infantry until November 1839, when he was promoted to a Captain in the quartermaster's department. He served in the Seminole war in Florida, and in the Mexican war, being brevetted Major in the latter for gallantry in the battle of Palo Alto and Resaca de la Palma; and Lieutenant Colonel for gallant conduct at Churubusco. Gen. Myers married a daughter of Gen. David E. Twiggs, a soldier of the war of 1812 and commander of one of the two divisions of the regular army in the Mexican war.

International Conference.  
LONDON, June 20.—In the House of Commons this evening, Sir James Ferguson, the parliamentary secretary of the Foreign office, in reply to an inquiry, stated that the government were considering a proposal for the proposed conference at Washington of representatives of maritime countries, but he did not think it desirable to reveal the subjects to be discussed until they have been agreed upon by the countries which take part in the conference. He would say, however, that England desired to narrow the issues to be considered, so that they should not include questions which should be regulated by municipal legislation.
