There is something exceedingly touching, something grandly sublime in this patient waiting for, this hopeful looking for, of the One promised in Scripture who was to rule Israel and redeem him from all his troubles; a King expected to come from His throne on high, and rule on earth with some of the pomp and glory of His celestial kingdom, Him who did come in great humility, who was buffetted, scorned, and at length put to death, a faithful few accepted as the promised Messiah; and by those few was disseminated the belief that now holds the Christian world; that the Messiah has come, and that he will be seen here no more until the Second Coming.

Against this belief the Jewsstand steadfast. Scattered abroad over the face of the whole earth, they cling with grand tenacity to their own faith, and to the fulfilment of their long deferred hope. For them, the promised Messiah is yet to come. For them, the patient waiting and looking for is yet to have its reward. OUR CRIMINAL CODE.

A gentleman learned in the law, and from his position, largely associated with the execution of it, protests against our criminal law as a bloody and cruel one, and embracing too many crimes in its fatal purpose, From our point of view, we do not agree with him in thinking the number of crimes classed as criminal too many, though in those there might be more liberal construction to their extreme extension. These crimes are four Murder, arson, burglary, rape.

Our old criminal law, derived from the barbarous English criminal code, indiscriminate, remorseless, bloody, which hung as well for stealing a piece of pie as for murder, for snaring a rabbit as well as for taking human life, for counterfeiting a bank of England bill and for forging a note, which weekly gave its Monday matince of execution at Tyburn gallows tree, when from ten to twenty hanging wretches a nused the brutal crowd with their horrible struggles and contortions, was too nearly cruel faithful copy of the original.
