Its Development and Progress Advantageously Set Forth.

WAYNESVILLE, N. C., July 4, 1889.
 Editor Citizen—The new bank is opened. It is an institution long needed, and its business outlook is flattering. The Farmers' Alliance perfected their county organization yesterday. Crops in the county are reported good. The rains seriously interfere with harvesting the wheat crop, which is better than it has been for years. Our prospects are prosperous condition. Merchants and farmers in town report business good. Some of our people have the Washington Territory (or State) fever. Others are suffering from Washington City malaria, hence for the first time in the history of the county some very valuable lands are offered for sale at prices which ought to attract seekers for them.

The rain for the past few days has given us plenty of mud and now and then the fog settles down on the mountain tops and gives our place the appearance of being a comparatively level rolling land, but the breeze and sunshine soon clear away the fog and our mountain paradise is restored, with all its beauty and grandeur.

Hotel proprietors and boarding house keepers are wearing cheerful faces, as the seekers after pleasure and health arrive and secure comfortable quarters. The laughing waters, merry songs of birds and waving branches of our undulating forests all join in giving them a hearty welcome, perhaps as nowhere else felt and realized. The guardian angel stands ever ready with an invisible fan charged with life and health to cool the fevered brow, infuse new life and paint the languid cheek with the rosy hue of health.

If some philosopher like Horace Greeley would stand on Asheville court square, or at the west end of Battery Park with uplifted arms and extended fingers towards the balmy peaks, when the morning sun kisses a last good night to all east of the Mississippi; doubtless, hundreds would board the morning train for Waynesville and the Haywood White Sulphur Springs, where the rising sun first kisses the diamond dew from the grass, and health, life and vigor is imparted by the gentle mountain breeze, and imbibed in the clear cool waters. Bill Before the Commission.
 LONDON, July 4.—The examination of Michael Davitt was continued before the Parnell commission to-day. Mr. Davitt said he did not know the whereabouts of the books or the Ladies' League. He was also ignorant as to the manner in which the £70,000 that had passed through the Ladies' League had been expended. The Pentana black list, he said, was the list of persons who had been expelled either for stealing funds or for blackguarding conduct. He thought the government's means of deterring men from crime was to discover the real criminal when the law had been violated. He considered that the widow Walsh acted nobly in sacrificing her innocent son, rather than turn informer. Attorney General Webster here read extracts from the Irish World. Mr. Davitt invariably disapproved the sentiments expressed in the articles quoted. He thought the expression of such sentiments was injurious to the Irish cause.

The Americans Score Again.
 LONDON, July 4.—The Massachusetts rifle team shot against the Sussex team at Brighton, to-day. The right was won by a strong wind was blowing. The Americans won by 988 points against 910 for the Sussex team. The totals at each range are 230 yards; Americans 516, Sussex 230; five hundred yards, Americans 346, Sussex 312; six hundred yards, Americans 325, Sussex 270.
