We are very well aware that for man years there has going on a large efflox of French Canadians into the United States That race is remarkably, prolitic and remarkably poor, though, with their cheer ful vivacious natures, patient under pri vation, and brave under hardship. Ha with the rapid growth of population re markable under such adverse condition the demands of subsistence pressed so heavily upon the sources of supply that immigration became compulsory. The outflow was naturally upon adjacen New England, where, in some respects. conditions were the reverse; for there natural increase is small, and the native population impelled by the spirit of change and steadily moving to new fields. This spirit brought about a remarkable change in the manufacturing districts, which, once characteristicall and honorably native, became so dimin ished in home labor as to make necessary the substitution of an imported foreign element. This was supplied by the immigrating French Canadians. They have come in in very large numbers, and this is the extent, we think, of the foundation upon which the enthusiastic visionary, Mr. Thibault
