**SOMETHING ADMIRABLE.**

**Good Fellowship and Rational Recreation.**

We are indebted to a very intelligent gentleman, a visitor here, for an insight into an institution for young men, and for old ones too, which possesses so many attractions as to fix our attention at once. It is called the Twilight Club, and its objects are to cultivate good fellowship and enjoy rational recreation. And the term "good fellowship" and "rational recreation" imply something very far above the fellowship of a factitious hilarity, and rises into the realms of intellectual which is emphatically "rational." The very principles of the club set forth unmistakably its antagonism to dissipated levity and unworthy amusement. In fact it sets its face rigidly against those very things which encourage dissipation and criminal waste of time. Some of the offences against which it inscribes its emphatic "no," while they convey a sense of humor also carry a very grave meaning. "No debts, no full dress, no defalcations, no late hours, no profanity, no scandal, no bribery, no free dinners, no gambling, no duds, no humbugs," these, among others, fence out most of the graver vices, and invite to unconventional, rational and intellectual enjoyment.

One of the features of the Twilight Club is its fortnightly dinners, not a mere epicurean symposium, but a true "feast of reason and a flow of soul." To verify this idea a glance at the list of speakers and talkers, and the subjects they discuss, will testify to the ennobling as well as enjoyable features of those dinners. Selecting only a few out of a hundred examples, we find the Rev. Dr. Rylance speaking on Religion and Social Organization, Democracy in England, by Henry George, Newspapers Gone to Seed, by James Parton, The Hours of Labor, by Edward Atkinson, Social Forces in the United States, by Edward Everett Hale, and so on *ad infinitum*, through a list of splendid names, and a text of lofty subjects that engage the best thoughts of the country.  
 We throw out the hint that here such a club might take root and flourish, and would find abundant material not only among residents but among the numerous gentlemen of culture who resort hither for health and recreation, and who might be glad to give elegant diversity to many leisure or weary hours.

**CRIMINAL COURT DOCKET.**

**A Review of Some of the Cases to Be Heard.**  
 The criminal court will begin its January term on Monday morning, with Judge Moore on the bench. There are thirty-nine cases on the docket, the usual number being petty ones. Two murder trials, those of Berry and Fore, will probably be the most interesting. Both were tried at the preceding term. In the former the jury disagreed. Fore was found guilty, but the judge set the verdict aside. The R. & D. railroad is defendant in two suits. They are for alleged failure to repair bridges.  
 James Rash and John Treadway will be called upon to answer to a charge of disturbing a religious meeting. The facts happened twelve months ago. Rash is also defendant in a suit for assault with a deadly weapon.  
 The case of the State vs. Hunter will no doubt be an interesting one. Hunter arrested a man for drunkenness, and on trial the prisoner was acquitted. He now brings suit through the State against Hunter for false imprisonment.  
 There are two cases for bribery at the last election. They are those of the State vs. Mike Kelley and John Moore. It is the opinion that they will be dismissed without hearing. In a similar case at the last term the defendant was acquitted.

**THE DEAD AVERY.**

**Additional Particulars of This Very Bad Event.**

The Washington Post gives the following particulars of the lamentable death of young Morrison Avery. It is the saddest in all its incidents we have almost ever recorded.  
 A distressing accident occurred this morning by which Mr. Morrison R. Avery, a promising young man, lost his life. Mr. Avery, who was an assistant topographer in the geological survey, occupied a suit of rooms with a couple of friends, young men of about his own age, in the boarding house No. 512 13th street northwest. This morning he arose a little before 8 o'clock and walked across the room to the bureau on which there happened to be standing two bottles. One contained whisky but, bore no label to that effect, the other was plainly marked "pure rye whiskey," but was filled with carbonic acid, which through exposure to the presence of some foreign ingredients had become of a dark brown color. Neither of his room mates suspected that the bottle contained but what the label was marked, and nothing was said when the unfortunate young man raised the wrong bottle to his lips to take a taste of the contents. They were all chattering pleasantly at the time and the others were horrified at the change that came over their friend. It is supposed that he must have taken several large swallows, for the poison began to act immediately. Before the other two had realized what had happened young Avery had fallen back unconscious.  
 Drs. Rozier Middleton and James S. Cob were at once summoned from the emergency hospital and did all they could to save the young man's life, working hard even after it was thought life was extinct. Emetics were given, respiration sustained by artificial means, but the acid had completely paralyzed the stomach and there was no possible chance of saving his life. He never regained consciousness for a moment and died quietly and without apparent pain about 9.15 o'clock.

**ALFRED McELRATH IN JAIL.**

**He Voluntarily Gave Himself up Last Night.**

Alfred McElrath, the slayer of Charles Ricketts, is occupying a cell in the county jail. He was brought in early last evening by his attorneys, Messrs. Cobb & Merfium and T. A. Jones and surrendered to the jailer, and so quietly was it all done that not even the police force knew of it until some time later. They did know that he was to be brought in last night. Col. Baird, who has had charge of the case, had advised his being turned over to the authorities, and his attorneys as well as his family had consented.  
 The little fellow was seen at the jail last night. He is little more than a child in size and claims to be but twelve years old. He is no more than four feet high and very slender. He is a mulatto and altogether has a good face. His confinement does not appear to bother him in the least, and he is as unconcerned as though he had done nothing. When asked where he had been since last Tuesday night he replied: "Oh, jes nowhere," and when asked his meaning, he said he had been at the house of friends and had slept nights in haystacks and barns. His attorneys had advised him to say nothing of the affair which led to the killing or of the latter itself and he heeded the advice.  
 His story about his whereabouts since Tuesday night is not credited by the force. One of them says that he saw him coming in yesterday from Shiloh with a companion, and it is their belief that he was taken there as soon as it was known that he had killed Ricketts.

 On account of several complaints received from different tobacco warehouses in Asheville and Danville, as to discrimination against their houses on account of the allowance of a commission upon every package marked by an agent to warehouse paying such commissions, the following rules will apply hereafter:  
 No shipment of tobacco will be received by this company unmarked.  
 No agent of this company will be allowed to mark a tobacco shipment, or any package thereof.  
 All agents of this company are furnished with a marking pot and brush and they will allow any shipper to use it whenever so requested.  
 No agent of this company will be allowed to receive a commission for any service connected with his employment in such capacity, other than upon the regular pay rolls.  
 A failure to comply with either of the above rules will subject the offender to discipline from our service.

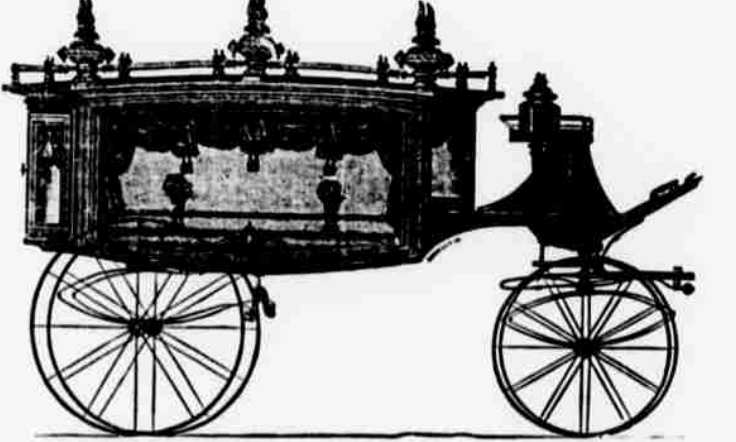
