

FIFTY MILES IN WIDTH.

The Ohio River Still Rising-Ma ny Lives in Danger.

CAIRO, Ill., March 4.—The Ohio river is now over fifty miles wide at this point. It extends from the Cairo level, which holds it banked up forty feet above the lower water mark in Kentucky, till it strikes the hills, there forming one solid sheet of water except for the narrow strips of rock-bound earth upon which the Mobile and Ohio and Illinois Central callender run south. A mile below here the Mobile and Ohio and Illinois Central railroads run south. A mile below here it joins the Mississippi, which in turn extends into the Missouri, another fifty miles making the combined width of the two rivers about 300 miles. The current is terrific and brings great quantities of heavy drift, making navigation perilous. The ferry boat Three States made two trips to East Cairo yesterday and one up the Mississippi to the Missouri, recurner groupe camped out on ground on g people camped out on ground which they supposed was beyond the reach of the flood, but which was being rapidly submergen. Already water has reached within a lew feet of the door of the Richmond House which stands on the river front, and two great tobacco warehouses are flooded. Ten thousand hogsheads of tobocco stored in them were removed last week. On Sunday the marine ways were compelled to suspend operations because of the flood, and the steamer ldlewild, which was ungergoing repairs, had to be let down unfinished.

Mr. Dolph, from the special committee charged with the duty of the investigation of the leaks by which the proceedings of the executive session became public, submitted a series of resolutions, the preamble to which recited the progress thus far made by the committee, and directing the committee to again question A. Coast Line will not Consolidate. RALEIGH, N. C., March 3.-A general officer of the Atlantic Coast line says the West Point Terminal is endeavoring to secure control of the Atlantic Coast line. The Atlantic Coast Line is on friendly terms with the Terminal, and they have made no overture for either the purchase or control of the Coast line. The bills introduced in the Virginia legislature to consolidate certain roads is intended to checkmate the West Point Terminal company, but as a separate set of officers have to be elected for each of the roads under the present charter. and each has to be operated separately, which very greatly increases the expense of management, it is to put them under one set of officers, and thus reduce the operating expenses, that the bill is introduced.
