

AT THE FALLS CITY

The Effect of the Great Cyclone Rapidly Disappearing. Number of Killed Now Known to Be Seventy-Six.

Complete List as Furnished by the Coroner - The Work of Relief Systematically Proceeding - Poor People the Heaviest Losers in Jeffersonville, Ind. Great Damage Done in Tennessee.

LOUISVILLE, April 4. - The work of repairing the damage done by the cyclone is pressed forward energetically. Walls are being put in place, roofs repaired on all sides. The work of clearing the streets entirely of wreckage was begun Tuesday.

The work of relief is now proceeding systematically. A half-dozen clinics are kept busy tending the stragglers of those in need, another pays out the necessary sums of money, and still another records both the name of the applicant and the amount paid out. It is next to impossible for one name to be drawn twice and not be recorded. The names, address, amount of property destroyed, all are carefully filed in the blank lines of the application.

Nothing but absolute need is relieved, and that only for the present. Only a few were as large as \$20, and they were for burial expenses. The majority were \$5 and \$8 disbursements.

It has been decided by the underwriters that where a building has been only partially destroyed the fire insurance will be allowed to stand if proper repairs are made. Where buildings are totally destroyed the insurance is canceled, but premiums paid in advance are returned.

While at work on the repairs at the Falls City tower, workmen on Monday night, Ernest Leary fell, receiving injuries which will probably prove fatal. An examination of the ruined district shows several hundred where windows and the greatest victims of the wind.

The "Fort Nelson" building at Eighth and Main was in the very center of the storm, but sustained little damage. It is one of the most substantial buildings in the city, its walls of brick and stone being unusually thick. Its chimney and roof were considerably damaged, and a big sign made in the top fell away, but it suffered little damage other than that.

Out of about eighty houses destroyed by the tornado in Jeffersonville the owners of four-fifths of this number are poor people, whose little homes were their only possessions. All the business ones have been given shelter by their more fortunate neighbors, but the situation over there has been much undervalued, and it is a mistake to suppose that no assistance is needed in the city.
