CLAUS SPRECKELS hasn't built yet the second of the new sugar refineries with which it was said he proposed to revolutionize the sugar trade of this country.

THE LAW forbidding Chinamen to enter this country has given rise to a new, thriving and apparently prosperous industry—the smuggling of Chinamen across the Canadian and Mexican frontiers. Our borders on the north and on the south are so long that it is practically impossible to watch them effectively, and Chinamen, although represented as poverty stricken, can afford to pay liberally for being piloted across them in safety.

WHEN it appears that each congressman undertakes to control appointments to about 250 offices, and to look after about 1700 applicants for these positions, we can readily see to what an extent the federal patronage has come to interfere with the duties which he has been elected to perform.

A NEW political party is to be formed in Chicago largely composed of English, Scotch, Welsh and Canadians. They will soon hold a convention of 400 members and draw up a party platform. Its principal plank will be, unswerving loyalty to the public school system, and will pledge its members to vote for no one inimical to the system, as existing. They claim that they will work on strictly American lines, and support none but "dyed-in-the-wool" Americans for office, and that they can control 23,000 votes in Cook county that will be cast solidly against any platform encroaching upon the domain of the State by the clerics of any creed.

THE BILL prepared by the American Forestry Association is to come before a sub-committee of the public lands committee of the house, and it is important that the necessity of this or a similar measure should be impressed upon congress. The permanent preservation and proper administration of a sufficient forest area, especially upon mountain slopes and about the head waters of streams, are most essential for the regulation of our water supply as well as necessary to provide an adequate growth of timber in the future.

Another Industry. Messrs. E. F. Kizer and W. J. Cobb, of Monroeton, Pa., who have been spending several days prospecting in Western North Carolina, have returned to their home. They will return in a few weeks with a view of investing, and will perhaps move their chair manufacturing here. They are well pleased with the fine timbers as well as the climate and scenery.

A Railroad Accident. A broken axle on a freight car delayed the Murphy train, due here at 3:55 p. m. yesterday, until 12:30 this morning. Two cars were derailed and the trestle over the Tennessee river was broken through. One car fell about five feet through the bridge and lodged.

Another graded school, for whites, is to be built at Winston.

Extensive storage warehouses for farm products are to be built at Concord.

Miss Polly Inscoc lived 93 years at Sandy creek, near Franklin, and died a few days ago.

Thos. C. Callum, formerly of Greensboro, died at Baltimore. He had recently moved to that city.

Wilmington Presbytery is in session at that city. Rev. A. McFadyen preached the opening sermon.

A special term of the superior court will be held in Ashe county beginning the second Monday in June.

All of the twenty-five manufacturing concerns at Greensboro are running on full time and are prospering.

Rev. Baylus Cade, formerly of Virginia, has resigned the pastorate of Frankfort Baptist church after four years' service.

The contracts for the grading of the railway from Salisbury to Albemarle, the county seat of Stanley county, have been let.

New York capitalists will take \$145,000 of the \$300,000 of the capital stock of the Winston Land and Improvement company.

An Episcopal church to cost \$10,000 is to be built at Oxford. That denomination will also build a handsome church at Hickory.

Col. W. H. H. Cowles has appointed Charles E. Robinson, son of ex-Sheriff J. A. Robinson, of Lincoln, a cadet at West Point.

The schooner Union, of New York, bound south for lumber, went ashore near Ocracoke and is a total loss. The crew were saved.

The citizens of Person county have decided to have a grand celebration next month in honor of the completion of the railway to Roxboro.

New Bern has what it styles "electric light bugs." Hundreds collect about the street lamps nightly and disappear only when the lights are extinguished.

Near Yanceyville a negro shot Mr. Don Cameron. The gun was loaded with small shot and the wounds are not dangerous. The negro, Cary Roan, is in jail.

Next Tuesday the committee of the State Baptist Female College meets at Raleigh and chooses the site, which it now appears will be in the centre of the city.

A company with \$50,000 capital has been formed to operate the Elm Grove cotton mills, in Lincoln county, and in a few months the mills will be again running.

S. Kirkpatrick, the wounded revenue agent, is in a hospital in Baltimore under the treatment of an oculist. One eye-ball is to be removed that the sight of the other eye may be saved.
