The criminal court convenes next Monday. The session will necessarily be of short duration, as the federal court meets May 6.

NORTH CAROLINA NOTES.

Goldboro is to have four public drinking fountains. The State librarian is preparing to issue a new catalogue.

Wake superior court, civil term, is in session, Judge McRae presiding. Vance county claims a whetstone quarry inferior to none in the world.

Dr. J. Henry Smith has been pastor of a Greensboro church for thirty-one years. E. M. Short, of Washington, has lost three sets of dry kilns in the last two years.

Winston has fifty-five tobacco factories and 19,000,000 of plugs are shipped from there yearly. Five hundred and one mortgages on land in Hyde county have been recorded in the last ten years.

Several hundred pounds of cotton were destroyed by fire in the Big Falls cotton factory at Graham. Eighteen more convicts have been sent from the penitentiary to the Roanoke and Southern railway.

The index of the 104th North Carolina law reports is being completed. The volume will soon be out of press. A hurricane blew down four houses and damaged several others near a mine at Indian Trail, Union county.

Forest fires destroyed 200 cords of wood for M. McD. Williams, near Spout Springs, in Cumberland county. Wayne Lodge, No. 112, Masons, of Goldsboro, had twenty-eight members last January. Now it has fifty-one.

A rumor is being circulated and is going the rounds of the State press that Bishop Lyman is soon to be married. Thirty hands are employed clearing up the proposed site of the North Carolina Steel and Iron company at Goldsboro.

A. H. Motley & Co., a Reidsville tobacco firm, have sent a salesman around the world in the interest of their house. If James Gilmore, of Lexington, had lived until August he would have been 100 years old. He died a few days ago.

Joseph Daniels, the editor of the Raleigh State Chronicle, will deliver the commencement address at Graham College. John Ellis was tried at Lenoir on a charge of assaulting a nine year old girl. The evidence was insufficient and he was discharged.

Mr. William U. Steiner, for sixteen years a resident of Guilford county, is dead. He was a prominent active member of the I. O. O. F. Major M. H. Pride, of Mt. Holly, is the owner of a chicken which has a taste for feathers. All the other fowls in the yard suffer in consequence.

Interviews with farmers from Granville, Durham, Orange, Alamance, Person and Caswell counties are to the effect that the tobacco crop will be poor. William Ziegler, a Winston negro, was found guilty of an attempt to rape an 80-year-old and blind white woman. He was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary.

The supreme court has begun the call of the Twelfth district. Next Monday the call of appeals set at the end of the docket will begin, commencing with those from the First district. A mulatto boy at Wilmington named Ben Strayhorn fired two shots at a colored man named Allen. The fact that he was fined only \$15 is all that is necessary to show that his aim was poor.

A shaded blue crane was killed near Gladesboro. It measured six feet from tip to tip, five feet and two inches from its toes to its bill, and when it opened its mouth its took up seven inches of space. Dr. John F. Crowell, of Trinity College, will deliver the annual address before the literary societies of the Collegiate Institute at commencement, and Rev. J. Y. Fair, of Richmond, will preach the annual sermon.

The Greensboro Workman learns that the subscriptions for stock in a steel company have footed up at about \$500,000 and that when \$500,000 have been subscribed the books of subscription will probably be closed until a sale of land is made. Four gentlemen of Worthville have caught 375 pounds of fine fish in Deep river this season. Mr. Troglon killed at one shot three white suckers weighing four pounds each, and at another time a trout weighing six and three quarter pounds.

Mr. Solomon Rouse, who lived near Mount Olive, was completely cremated at his home. A half gallon measure held all the remains that were found. Just how the sad accident befell him is not known. There is not the slightest suspicion of foul play. The Wilmington Messenger enjoyed its twenty-third anniversary on Tuesday and the event was celebrated with a banquet to all of the employees at the Orton. The Messenger has reason to be proud of its long and useful life and is now one of the best papers in North Carolina.

The Governor's Guard, a crack military organization of Raleigh, have made arrangements for a concert and prize drill, open to the State, on the 29th. The best drilled man is to receive \$50 and the second \$10. The Guard will not enter for the prizes and its three ranking officers will be the judges. A most distressing accident occurred at Monroe last Friday. The children of C. N. Simpson, having through curiosity removed the covering from a well which is being dug in the yard, were playing around the same, when Baxter, a 3-year-old child, approaching too near, fell in, and striking his head against a rock, was instantly killed.

The moonshiners are outrageously bold in their behavior in Person county. They forced their way into the jail in Roxboro a few nights ago, in order to get some contraband whiskey, and now they have forced their way into a main store at Hurdle's Mills, in order to regain possession of part of a whiskey still which had been seized by revenue officers. The mob was heavily armed, masked and well mounted. The following officers have been elected for the Inter-Collegiate Oratorical Association: B. C. Clark, of Davidson College, president; A. S. White, of Trinity College, vice-president; W. A. Gilton, of Davidson College, secretary and treasurer; D. A. Blackburn, of Davidson, and R. L. Durham, of Trinity, executive committee. The contest for the gold medal will take place in the Y. M. C. A. hall of Charlotte on the 9th day of May.
