There were 120 arrivals at the principal hotels yesterday.

Capt. Nat Atkinson has gone to Transylvania on business.

Gen. E. Donnellay has returned after a long absence in New York City.

The bricklaying on the west side of South Main street has been completed.

Miss Mary Price, of Emory, Va., is visiting Dr. M. L. Neilson on Woodfin street.

Workmen are engaged refitting the room at 31 Patton avenue for Kayser & Smith.

During the thunder storm yesterday afternoon the lightning tapped the fire alarm bell several times.

Marriage licenses have been issued to Joe A. McVee and Alice Popper and R. A. Suttle and Lina Bartlett.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Jones and Miss May Jones, of Richmond, have taken rooms at the Battery Park.

Capt. M. J. Pagg who has been very sick for three weeks at his home on Merrimon avenue is improving.

George H. Starnes today sold to Alford Rich a lot on Hiwassee and Cherry streets 75x350 for \$3,000.

To-morrow is commencement Sunday at Weaverville College, and Rev. R. N. Price will deliver the annual sermon.

The workmen are engaged in tearing down the old Hilliard building on South Main street preparatory to erect the new one.

Frank Shepard and Hugh Atkinson have returned from Emory and Henry College, where they have been attending school.

Mr. H. B. King, of Augusta, Ga., who is building a handsome residence on Merrimon avenue, is expected to arrive here to-night.

It is very probable that an appeal from the report of the jury on Flint street through Mrs. Sondley's property will be taken.

Messrs. Hargan and Starnes have a large force of hands grading new streets through their recent purchase in north-west Asheville.

Capt. James Battle, brother of Dr. S. W. Battle of this city and whom he has been visiting for several days left for his home in the east to-day.

Mr. E. W. Burkholder is preparing plans for a handsome casino, a boat house and three music stands for the Asheville Loan, Construction and Improvement company.

Rev. G. C. Rankin, pastor of the Central M. E. church, South, will address the young men's meeting at the Y. M. C. A. rooms to-morrow at 5 p. m. All young men are invited.

D. L. Reynolds and Reuben McBrayer have purchased from W. M. Cooke 25 acres on the Beaverton road, two miles from the court house, for \$8,000. They will improve the property.

John Whitmore, of Ivy, was before the Mayor this morning charged with being drunk. He was discharged. J. H. Barnard was fined \$10 for resisting and abusing an officer, and gave notice of an appeal.

Mr. James T. Smith and wife, of Lexington, Ky., arrived in the city yesterday afternoon and have taken rooms at Mrs. McCape's. Mr. Smith has traveled extensively since a former sojourn in Asheville, and says no place exceeds it for atmosphere and scenery.

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JURY ON FLINT STREET

IT REPORTS TO THE BOARD LAST NIGHT.

MR. F. A. SONDELEY OBJECTS TO THE EXTENSION.

But the Report is Adopted. Business of the Board of Aldermen at their Meeting Last Night.

Mr. E. D. Carter, representing the Asheville Fast Line and Suburban Railroad company, asked the Board of Aldermen last night for a continuance of the railroad questions, because of the unexpected absence of Captain Atkinson, the gentleman representing the other roads, entered no objections and the continuance was granted.

Maj. T. C. Westall asked for Capt. Johnson, D. Johnston that a line for the front of the buildings on South Main street be established, and that all buildings be made to conform with the line. It was ordered that the line of Capt. Johnson's building be made to conform with that of the buildings above.

Mr. McNeely, in behalf of the purchasers of the property in Prospect park, asked the city to assist them in straightening and widening Jefferson drive. He wanted the street widened two feet. It was ordered that the street committee visit the property now, and after the completion of the work to report whether they deem it proper for the city to make an allowance for part of the expense.

The ordinance granting the privileges to the North Carolina Fuel company to lay its pipe in the streets, passed its final reading.

A communication from Capt. Thos. D. Johnson was read, asking that curbing for a pavement be put down on South water street. He offered to advance the money and have it taken out of his taxes. Captain M. E. Carter suggested that a permanent grade be established on the street. The matter was referred to the street committee with power to act.

The report of the jury on the extension of Flint street was read as follows:

The property of Mrs. H. E. Sondley was given as damaged \$750. The remainder were benefited: M. E. Roberts in the sum of \$262.50; Geo. H. Starnes, \$262.50; C. M. Mathis, \$112.50; and V. T. Belote, \$112.50.

Mr. F. A. Sondley, in behalf of his mother, objected to the proposed extension and the adoption of the report. He gave several reasons for his objections. Mr. J. S. Adams spoke for the other side, and asked the board to adopt the report, and Capt. M. E. Carter spoke in opposition to the adoption. Considerable discussion ensued and the report was finally adopted.

Mr. W. T. Reynolds asked to be allowed to widen Merrimon avenue in some places where it is narrower than the regular width, and have it taken out of his taxes. It was referred to the street committee.

Capt. W. B. Troy tendered his resignation as street superintendent, to take effect at a future date, and proposed to rent the room on the first floor of the old city hall. He asked that no action be taken on the resignation until he is able to complete certain work.

An ordinance making it unlawful for any one to remove, or in any manner to interfere with any water pipe belonging to the city, or to remove any plug, or to turn the water on when it has been shut off by the proper officers, was passed. The fine for violation of this ordinance was placed at \$25.

Messrs. Greer and Elliott were elected policemen in place of Edwards and Young, who were elected at the last meeting and did not accept.

The question of paying court square in front of the court house came up and it was ordered that General Young be instructed to make the pavement on North and South Main streets meet each other in front of the court house.

The chief of police said he had been notified by the sheriff to move the city scales from the present position, as they were the source of considerable annoyance. The Mayor was instructed to attend to the matter.

The committee appointed to have the telephones put in reported that they had made arrangements for the instruments at a cost of \$58 per year for the one at the pumping station and \$48 for the one at the city hall.

Clerk Miller was instructed to notify the Gamewell Fire Alarm company of the inefficiency of the present system.

The chairman of the street committee was instructed to have three or four men employed to repair the holes in the streets in the city.

AN IMPORTANT SALE.

The Chunn Place Sold for a Good Price. A large and important private sale of real estate was effected yesterday afternoon by Mr. D. S. Watson. It is that valuable property known as the Chunn place with a frontage of nearly 400 feet on Patton Avenue, 257 on Bailey and 280 on Grove streets, and contains two acres.

The property was bought some years ago by Mr. S. M. Thomas of Laurinburg, N. C., for \$6,000. He now receives \$40,000 for it.

The purchasers are Messrs. J. R. Rich, W. T. Weaver, Fulton Starnes, and Mark Roberts, who propose in the near future to subdivide the property into business lots and resell. The situation of the property renders it very desirable.

An Asheville Man Married.

Mr. Henry Hardwick and Miss Anna L. C. Cornell, of Somerville, N. J., were married at the home of the bride on Wednesday, Mr. Hardwick is census supervisor for this district and a popular lawyer. The couple met while the bride was here for her health some time ago. They will travel some time before returning to Asheville.

PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

Something of Interest to all Good Democrats.

The plan of organization adopted by the State Democratic Committee for the guidance of the party is as follows:

TOWNSHIP ORGANIZATION.

1. The unit of county organization shall be the township. In each township there shall be an executive committee, to consist of five active democrats, who shall be elected by democratic voters of the same township in meetings called by the county executive committee. And said committee so elected shall elect one of its members as chairman, who shall preside at all committee meetings.

2. The several township executive committees shall convene at the meetings of the several county conventions, or at any time and place that a majority of them may elect, and shall elect a county executive committee, to consist of not less than five members, one of whom shall be designated as chairman, who shall preside at all said committee meetings.

3. In case there shall be a failure on the part of any township to elect its executive committee for the period of thirty days, the county executive committee shall appoint said committee from the active voters of that township.

4. The members of the township committees shall elect to any vacancy occurring in said committee.

5. The county executive committee shall call necessary county conventions by giving at least ten days notice by public advertisement in three public places in each township, at the court house doors, and in any democratic newspaper that may be published in said county, requesting all democrats of the county to meet in convention in their respective townships on a common day, therein stated, which said day shall be held on the third day before the meeting of the county convention, for the purpose of electing their delegates to the county conventions. Thereupon the conventions so held shall elect their delegates to represent the townships in the county conventions.

6. Each township shall be entitled to cast in the county convention one vote for every twenty-five democratic votes, and one vote for fractions of fifteen democratic votes cast by that township at the last county convention. Provided, That every township shall be entitled to cast at least one vote, and each township may send as many delegates as it sees fit.

7. In cases where townships consist of more than one ward or precinct, each of said wards or precincts shall be entitled to send delegates to county conventions, and shall cast its proportionate part of its township's vote, based upon the last preceding vote for Governor in said township.

8. The chairman of township committees shall preside at all township conventions. In their absence any other member of said committee may preside.

9. In cases when all the township executive committees are required to meet for the purpose of electing a county executive committee, said meeting shall be deemed to have a quorum when a majority of such townships shall be represented in said meeting.

COUNTY AND DISTRICT CONVENTIONS.

1. The several county conventions shall be entitled to elect, to their senators, judicial and congressional conventions one delegate and one alternate for every fifty democratic votes, and one delegate for fractions over twenty-five democratic votes cast at the last preceding county convention, in their respective counties, and none but delegates or alternates so elected shall be entitled to seats in said conventions: Provided, that every county shall have at least one vote in each of said conventions.

2. The chairman, or in his absence any member of the county senatorial, judicial and congressional committee, shall call to order their respective conventions and hold the chairmanship thereof until the convention shall elect its chairman.

3. The executive committees of the senators, congressional and judicial districts, respectively, shall, in the call of their respective chairmen, meet at some time and place in their respective districts designated in said call. And it shall be their duty to appoint the time and place for holding conventions in their respective districts, and the chairman of said respective committees shall immediately notify the chairman of the district county executive committees of said appointment, and the said county executive committees shall forthwith call conventions of their respective counties in conformity to said notice, to send delegates to said respective district conventions.

STATE CONVENTIONS.

The State convention shall be composed of delegates appointed by the several county conventions. Each county shall be entitled to elect one delegate and one alternate for every one hundred and fifty democratic votes cast in that county at the preceding gubernatorial election; and none but delegates so elected shall be entitled to seats in said convention: Provided, that any county shall have at least one vote in said convention.

GENERAL RULES.

1. Such delegates (alternates of absent delegates) as may be present at any democratic convention shall be allowed to cast the whole vote to which their township or county may be entitled.

2. In all conventions provided for by this system, after a vote is cast, there shall be no change in such vote until the final result of the ballot shall be announced by the chairman of said convention.

3. All democratic executive committees shall have the power to fill any vacancies occurring in their respective bodies.

4. That the chairman of the different county conventions shall certify the list of delegates and alternates to the different district and State conventions, and a certified list of said delegates and alternates to the State conventions shall be sent to the secretary of the State central committee.
