AT SIXES AND SEVENS

The London Police Are Badly Demoralized.

NO STRIKE IS NOW PROBABLE

The Men Are Deficient in Organization and Have Commenced Quarreling Among Themselves - In Public Sympathy Lies Their Only Hope of Redress.

LONDON, July 10.—Several meetings of policemen were held, the chief feature of which was the general disposition displayed by the men to quarrel among themselves. It is quite evident that what little spirit of organization their movements had has disappeared and the entire force is at sixes and sevens. The ringleaders are blaming one another for the failure of the attempted strike and not supporting them at the critical time. The men on duty are restless and sullen. It is true they are to all outward appearances obeying orders with their customary promptness, but the discipline of the force has been seriously shaken and their work is being done perfunctorily. No strike possible.

But if the men are lacking in discipline, they are still more deficient in organization, and this state of affairs removes all possibility of a general strike. The wiser counsels of the veterans are having great influence over their younger fellows. The older men fear to engage in a strike and deplore such a movement, lest it shall alienate the sympathy of the public from the grievances of the police, which will ultimately be redressed. The disorders were merely local affairs, and were quickly suppressed.

The men at their meetings decided not to combine with the postmen, but to fight their own battles. Two merchants offered the police £1,000 if they would persevere in their attempts to bring about a general strike, but their offer was refused.

The Police Poorly Paid. The police are not without sympathizers in parliament in their efforts to better their condition. Mr. Pickersgill points out that the ordinary dockman at 6 pence (12 cents) an hour, if he worked the ordinary number of hours that a London policeman is on duty would receive more pay than many of the constables. The metropolitan police receive from 24 to 30 shillings (80 to 75) a week and the city police an average of 2 shillings more than the metropolitan.

South Africa Disgranted. LONDON, July 10.—Lord Salisbury's answers to the south African deputations in regard to the Anglo-German agreement, displays culpable ignorance on the part of the ministry of the wishes of the Cape government, and are not calculated to reconcile the south African colonies to the changes contemplated by the agreement.

The Saratoga Strikes a Rock. LONDON, July 10.—The Philadelphia nautical school ship Saratoga, while leaving Plymouth harbor for Southampton, struck Duke rock. She was backed off in a few minutes and anchored. It is believed that the damage to the vessel, if any, is only trifling and the vessel proceeded for Southampton.

Another Lottery Victory. NEW ORLEANS, July 10.—The lottery bill passed the house over the governor's veto.
