THE CYCLONE'S WORK

Reports Still Coming in from Tuesday's Storm.

MANY MAINE BUILDINGS LAID LOW

One Hundred Barns Blown Down. One of the Most Disastrous Storms That Ever Visited the State—Lightning Assists in the Work of Destruction—Storms Elsewhere.

Lewiston, Me., July 11.—Specials to The Journal from Somerset, Waldo, Oxford and Franklin counties indicate that the cyclone was one of the most disastrous that ever visited Maine.

The Sand river railroad bridge, near Phillips, was blown from its abutments into the river. Many barns were blown down all through Franklin county. At North Anson the bridge across Carraway river is twisted as to be unsafe. The Maine Central Institute at Pittsfield is damaged to a slight extent.

Capt. Goodrich's cottage at Madison was blown flat. The barn and stable of Hamilton Marston were struck by lightning and burned. William Grant's house in Bethel was moved from its foundation. At Thornbyke a store was demolished.

In various parts of Maine nearly 100 barns were blown down or unroofed.

Killed by Lightning.

SPRINGFIELD, O., July 11.—Arthur Boosinger, aged 20, while getting hay in out of the rain, was struck and instantly killed by lightning. His clothing, with the exception of his shirt, was torn clear of his body. A hole large enough to bury a dozen men in was torn in the ground at his feet.

The Work of Lightning.

CALAIN, Me., July 11.—A heavy thunderstorm, with hail, passed over here. Lightning struck the barn of William Farrell and burned the barn, house and outbuildings. Considerable other minor damage was done.

Barn Blown Down.

RICHMOND, Vt., July 11.—A heavy wind and rain storm passed over here. A barn owned by A. H. French was blown down and other damage done.

Two Tragedies on the Rail.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., July 11.—An unknown man was found lying alongside the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western track at Waverly about 5 a. m. There was nothing on his person by which he might be identified. The deceased appeared to be about 25 years of age, smooth face, weight about 160 pounds, height 5 feet 9 inches, dark blue clothing. About the same hour and at the same place Conductor Frank Phillips slipped from his train in front of a Lehigh Valley train and was instantly killed. He was 35 years of age and leaves a widow and five children.

Booming the World's Fair.

BALTIMORE, July 11.—Ex-Mayor Hodges, a commissioner from Maryland to the world's fair at Chicago, has just returned from a conference of the commissioners. He says: "The fair will be successful. The visitors and exhibitors will be much more perceptibly American and Canadian than European, but no one who knows the history and has seen the city and enterprises of Chicago would doubt the ability of her citizens to get up an exposition that will excite the wonder and admiration of all who go to see it."
