

General Fremont was born at Savan-Soaps—Prescription Depart- nah, Ga., in '1813. His father was a Frenchman, his mother a Virginian. He was educated at Charleston College, H. P. Cole of Hendersonville. South Carolina, and in 1833 shipped as instructor on the United States sloop Natchez. In 1842 he began that labor that will live for ages to come. It was set out to explore that country between secured, success attained the Missouri river and the Rocky mount the mayor this morning for earrying a tains. Returning, successful in the then great undertaking he was the lion of the distributor for a hundred hour. In 1843 he started out on another miles around—competition expedition planned on a more extensive scale. Going beyond the Rocky moun tain he explored a tract of country to which he gave the name "Great Basin," and went as far north as Fort Vancon ver. On the return trip they crossed the Sierra Nevada mountains, against the advice of their guides who claimed that no man had ever performed the journey As usual he was successful, although the trip cost his party many lives and the larger portion of his animals. In 1841 they returned to the United States.

For his gallant services the young explorer was raised to the rank of brevetcaptain. The fame of his discoveries and the heroic daring he had exhibited in his andertaking spread his name to all parts of the civilized globe.

In 1846 he returned to California and ook an active part in the war with Mexico. There he had a dispute with two of his superior officers and upon his return to Washington was censured for disobe dience. He would not admit the justice of the decision and resigned from th army. Two years later he went to California at his own expense and settled there. Directly after the state was ad mitted he was chosen senator. In 1853 he conducted a party at his own expense on an exploring trip to the Pacific. He was nominated by the republican national convention as a candidate for the presidency in 1856 but was defeated by Buchanan. In 1861 he was made major general and commander of the Departnent of Missouri. In 1862 he resigned. Since then Fremont has retired from public life but his influence was great up to the day of his death. His name will live many years.
