This is a Question Which at Present is Hard to Decide—One Report Says the Salvadorians Have Won the Battle, Another That They Have Been Beaten With a Heavy Loss—The Latest.

VICTORIOUS SALVADORIANS.

Said to Have Invaded Guatemala and Won Six Battles. LA LIBERTAD, July 27.—News has been received here confirming the reports of the success of the Salvadorian forces beyond the frontier, in Guatemalan territory. The Salvador army has now gained six battles and has captured quantities of arms and ammunition. Many have been killed and wounded on both sides...

GEN. EZETA'S DISPATCH.

Says They've Liked the Guatemalans Out of Their Boots. NEW YORK, July 27.—The Herald has the following: SANTA ANA, July 3.—The Guatemalan government, with the intention of helping the Guatemalans, ordered two of its lieutenants to invade our territory with troops. They were Dajauja and Santa Rosa, who enjoy the reputation of being very brave. They were driven out of Salvadorian territory in two great battles. Two bloody battles that followed on Guatemalan territory, in which the Salvadorians were victorious, caused great loss to the enemy, who lost artillery, guns and ammunition. Salvador has proved the fact of the Guatemalans' orders. We will not sell out nor accept a peace that is not honorable. From the start we did not care to provoke war. CARLOS EZETA.

SAN SALVADOR, July 26.—We have gained five glorious victories over Guatemalan territory. Our forces are now operating on Guatemalan territory. Our vessels of war are large. At the Guatemalan report the following has been received: GUATEMALA, July 27.—Ezeta's army having attacked the Guatemalan forces situated on the frontier, were defeated by our army under the command of Gen. Payotau San Cues. The enemy retired in the greatest disorder, abandoning Guatemalan territory, which they had invaded. HONDURAS' POSITION.

Advices From Tegucigalpa Under Date of June 30. TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, June 30.—All this country is greatly excited. Every village and town has its troops in readiness, as a revolution is expected at any moment. At the revolutionists are the way, organizing committees in Nicaragua. The assassination of the president of Salvador and the news also caused much excitement. President Brown, of Honduras, has a large force of men and all the time, as it is feared he may be killed also. I hear that Salvador and Guatemala will soon be at war, and that Nicaragua is to help Salvador, while Honduras is to prevent the Nicaraguans from doing so by not allowing them to pass through her country. I am left in doubt, Nicaragua, a battle was ready to march, and recruiting was going on actively.

PRESIDENT MENDEZ'S DEATH.

The Result of a Treasonable Plot, Headed by Gen. Ezeta. NEW YORK, July 27.—The World's advices by mail from San Salvador, under date of June 24, give a graphic description of the death of President Mendez on the night of June 24. A ball in honor of the inauguration of the republic was in progress at the palace, when a military revolt occurred on the streets, and a number of soldiers rushed madly into the hall room, causing the greatest excitement. While the guests were at the height Gen. Mendez appeared from an upper room, with his sword and revolver in hand, prepared to head his guard in quelling the disturbance. His guard, however, was the result of a treasonable plot, the leader in which was Gen. Carl Ezeta, the present provisional president.

War Declared.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 27.—The Guatemalan minister here has just received advices announcing the formal declaration of war against Salvador. NEW ROAD TO NIAGARA FALLS. NIAGARA FALLS, N.
