Forty-four more lots went under the hammer at Hendersonville yesterday They brought nearly \$8,000. A shor time ago the tract of which the lots that have been sold in the last three days form a part, was purchased for \$11,000. There were 200 lots in it. Up to last night a little over half of the land had been sold for \$26,000. Hendersonville real estate, like all that in the land of the sky is on the boom.

The sale yesterday was attended by The sale yesterday was attended by a crowd estimated at 3,000. It was bubbling over with enthusiasm and everything moved off in a highly satisfactory manner. The lots sold, lie across the railroad track from the passenger depot, and are situated on Park, French Broad, Second and Anderson avenues. They averaged sixty-five feet front. The highest price paid was by Mr. A. Schiff of Florida. He secured a desirable lot at \$6,25 a front foot. The lowest price was seventy-five cents. The property averaged \$2.50 a foot.
