## THE NEWS!

BY ASSOCIATED PRESS TO THE CITIZEN TO-DAY.

DATE FIXED FOR VOTE ON THE TARIFF BILL.

IT WILL COME IN ABOUT TWO WEEKS.

THE EASTERN STRIKE CONTINUES UNCHANGED.

WASHINGTON, August 25.—The senate met at 10 a. m., and the tariff bill was taken up. Mr. Aldrich referred to the unusual length of the discussion on the tariff bill, and said that the business of the country was in a state of anxious suspense pending the result of the senate's deliberation. This led him to ask the senators to consider the question of fixing the date of closing the debate. He said he would be glad to hear from the senators on the other side if they had any proposition to make in that regard.

Mr. Gorman said he thought he was at liberty to speak for his colleagues when he said they would be very glad, if the senator in charge of the bill had any suggestion to make, that he would make it now.

Senator Aldrich—I ask unanimous consent to have this adopted, and went on to read a resolution which proposed that consideration of the tariff bill shall be continued to the exclusion of all other business except the appropriation. He said: "My suggestion is that general debate shall close on the first of September."

Senator Gorman—"It would be satisfactory to the democratic side of the chamber if the time for general debate was extended to the 3rd of September, and then to have three days for five minutes debate. That would bring the time for taking a final vote to the 8th of September."

Senator Aldrich accepted the modification and the debate on the tariff bill will close as stated.

A SECRET YET.

Executive Council of Railway Employes in Session.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., August 25.—The executive council of the United Order of Railway employes went into session about 8 o'clock this morning. The council listened to a report formulated by the committee. At 11 o'clock Mr. Hannum, a member of the council, informed the Associated Press representative that it was impossible for the council to determine how long the present session would last.

"Certain it is," said he, "that the public need expect nothing from us until 5 or 6 o'clock. I can't say that it will be possible to give anything out then. When we are through no delay will be taken by us in letting the outcome of our meeting be known."

**KILLED HIS FAMILY.**

Horrible Tragedy on a Montana Ranch Sunday.

LIVINGSTON, Mont., August 25.—A man who gave his name as Arlington, reported to Sheriff Templeton yesterday afternoon that a rancher named Quinn, living twelve miles west of Livingston, had killed his wife and five children with a broad-axe.

The man was crazy, and when discovered, was sitting in the corner of the room with one of the dead children in his arms.

The bodies of all were horribly mutilated, the arms and legs being severed from them. The oldest girl, about 15, was cut almost in two. Several men went to the house and tried to capture Quinn, but he would allow no one to approach him, and was killed by one of the men in self-defense.

**SAVED HIS NECK.**

A Displaced Bone Brought Back Into Place.

PHILADELPHIA, August 25.—Harry Reigel, aged 14 years, residing at No. 511 North Forty-first street, fell from an elevator, landing on his head and dislocating his neck on May 8.

When brought to the Presbyterian hospital the case was considered hopeless, but by weights attached to the patient's head and feet the neck was eventually set and kept in place by means of a plaster of paris jacket, which, after a month's time, was removed, with the result that the displaced bones were properly set, and the patient now has full power of the neck.

**SUSPENDED ANIMATION.**

A Case of It in an Ohio Town Recently.

WASHINGTON, C. H., O., August 24.—Not far from Leesburg recently the little child of Mr. and Mrs. John Cox was taken ill, and as was supposed, died, Mr. T. W. Carson and family, of this city, relatives of Mrs. Cox, were summoned to the funeral, the child having been laid out for dead. Later a peculiar feeling came over the mother that her child was not dead. Going into the room where the little one lay, cold and motionless, the grief-stricken mother walked up to it, and in a clear, distinct voice spoke the child's name, when to her great joy, her darling opened its eyes. Her tears were turned to smiles, and picking the child in her arms she uttered exclamations of joy. The child is now nearly well.

**Colored Militia Encampment.**

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., August 25.—The first State encampment of colored militia in the history of Texas will open here September 24, and close on the 29th. It will be in all respects on the same footing as the white militia encampment, which met here in July. The State has given \$1,000 to assist in paying the expenses.

**A Negro Outlaw Captured.**

NASHVILLE, August 24.—Henry Sutton, who perhaps enjoys the reputation of being the most desperate negro outlaw Davidson county, Tenn., has yet offered to the hangman's noose, has at last been captured.

**Wheat Will Be High.**

MONTREAL, August 25.—Frost has prevailed over the whole province of Manitoba and the territories, 75 per cent. of the crop of wheat has been injured.

## LOOKS LIKE HYPNOTISM.

STRANGE SCENES IN A ST. LOUIS GOSPEL TENT.

Her Hearers Go Into a Kind of Trance and Say That While Unconscious They See Angels and Cherubim.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., August 25.—There are strange scenes in a Woodward gospel tent on Jefferson avenue which are attracting the attention of religious people.

A woman, Mrs. Woodward, excites her hearers to such a degree that at yesterday's meeting at one time there were as many as forty people lying in an unconscious condition on the platform and benches. They lay on their backs, some with their arms stretched out as though in ecstasy. Others were lying peacefully, while some had their hands clasped and their lips moved occasionally as if in prayer.

Several little girls lay as though they were peacefully sleeping. One little boy, who was lying on a bench, seemed to be sleeping as quietly as though he were in his own bed at home. The reporter touched his wrist to find out how his pulse was, and found it beating very rapidly. All those who became unconscious testify to visions, and to seeing angels and cherubim.

Rev. E. M. C. Botterill, the State evangelist for the V. M. C. A., was an interested spectator. "I will admit," he said, "that I never saw anything like it and it's beyond my comprehension. It must be that the people who go into that state are led into it by their imagination and the force of will stronger than their own. You know that 85 per cent. of the people can be controlled by others, and this undoubtedly illustrates the fact to a certain extent. But I never saw the equal."

**Cheering On the Knights.**

LONDON, August 25.—A meeting of 5,000 dock laborers was held yesterday. Mr. Burns, labor agitator, presiding. They passed resolutions of sympathy with the American Knights of Labor in their strike on the New York Central railway. Resolutions were adopted expressing hope for the success of the Knights.

FOREIGN.

Several cases of cholera are reported in the vicinity of Berlin.

There are 11,500 miners on a strike in the Pomerania district of Belgium.

The Berlin Post states that Emperor William has written a letter of thirty-six pages to Emperor Francis Joseph explaining the cause of the dismissal of Prince Bismarck.

**HOME.**

Walter Howe, commissioner of the New York aqueduct board, was drowned at Newport Friday.

A Nashville negro named J. J. Simmons has been jailed at Fayetteville, Tenn., on a charge of personating a government agent and fraudulently obtaining money.

The conservative railroad men estimate the prospective loss to the Old Colony Railroad company by the Quincy accident aside from the damage to the rolling stock, at one half million dollars.

Telegrams to Bradstreet show that the general autumn trade has begun with a fairly good demand. The South has excellent cotton and rice crops. The treasury disbursements this month have been very heavy, amounting to over \$30,000,000.

Frank M. Allen, the defaulting teller of the Capital City bank, Nashville, Tenn., has waived examination on the charge of embezzlement, and made bond to the amount of \$10,000 for his appearance before the next term of the criminal court.

The employes on the New York branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad have decided not to ask for an increase of wages at present on account of the New York Central strike, it being feared that the request of the men might be interpreted as a threat against the Pennsylvania road.

Henry E. Abbey has offered to Anton Rubinstein, the composer and pianist, \$100,000 for a tour through America during the coming season. Rubinstein is undecided whether to accept or not. Sarah Bernhardt will make a tour through the United States within a season or two.

The remains of Ericsson left New York for Sweden Sunday after imposing ceremonies both on land and water. The central feature of interest in the scene where a score of Government vessels, hundreds of other craft, and thousands of people were gathered, was the wooden casket that enclosed the fleshly carcase that had contained the jewel of genius.

WASHINGTON.

It is thought that the tariff debate will terminate in about ten days or two weeks.

Republican senators are to sign an agreement to postpone the force bill until December, with an understanding that they will then vote to suspend the rules so that the bill may be passed.

**Late City Items.**

In the Mayor's court this morning Jno. Watkins and John Morse, drunks, were fined \$5 each. Duncan McIntire, for disturbing the peace was fined \$5.

The Murphy Bulletin says: "Mr. William Britt, of Asheville, is here looking out a farming location for his father. We think his prospects for being suited are favorable."

The talented editor of the Wilson Advance visited Asheville recently. Here is his compliment for it: "Asheville is the 'queen city of the West.' There is no place in the State that presents a more city-like appearance. It is 'chock' full of people and they are 'on the go.'"

The Brevard Carolinian says: "Mr. Jos. Henderson, who got his arm broken in Asheville by falling from a scaffold a few weeks since, and has been visiting friends in Brevard since the accident, has about recovered and will return to his work in a few days.—Rev. Wm. Southern, a native of Transylvania county, who has charge of the city mission work of the First Baptist church at Asheville, is at home for a few days on a visit.—Dr. J. A. Burroughs, the popular Asheville physician, was called to Brevard again last Friday on professional business."
