The Eastern Railway Strike. It is evident now that the full power of the Knights of Labor is to be exerted to compel the New York Central to retire certain discharged men. On what ground can it be held that this company, or any company, should take back men of a kind it says it does not want, submit the dispute to arbitration or be punished by a general strike.

It does not appear that the men who were discharged and whose reinstatement was demanded were or were not fairly competent and reliable employees. In fact, General Manager Touhy plainly avows that they were dismissed on account of their mischievous disposition. That they were assiduous in cultivating discontent is not, we believe, denied.

As a matter of fact, precisely that is denied, and it is because the charge is one so easily made that THE CITIZEN believes the whole matter should have been submitted to the arbitration which the New York Central has declined.

But it is said that the right of an employer to discharge any employee with or without cause and with or without explanation is one that is necessary to the carrying on of his business; one that cannot be disputed. "What?" the employer may say, "have I not the right to say whom I shall pay my own money to?" The rule holds good in the main in the smaller companies hiring not more than a very few hundred men where all can be known by the employer; but where the number of employees reaches into the thousands the situation is different.

LATEST NEWS FROM NORTH CAROLINA.

—Telegrams of a more encouraging nature as to the condition of Rev. Dr. Hoge have been received at Wilmington.

—The negro woman, Aleck Morton, who was arrested for killing Julia Morgan, was tried at Kinston, N. C., before Judge Armfield and was convicted and sentenced to be hung October 17.

—In the Little River, Orange county, church neighborhood, recently the two-year-old son of Mr. John Wilson was walking backward when he fell into a pot of boiling lye. He died the next day.

—The State Superintendent of Public Instruction has made arrangements to send to every county superintendent of public instruction a set of questions for use at the September examinations of all teachers.

—Mr. J. A. Thomas, of New Hope township, informs the Chatham Record that he killed at one stroke, one day last week, thirty-five snakes of theadder species. Mr. Thomas cannot do better than to keep on striking.

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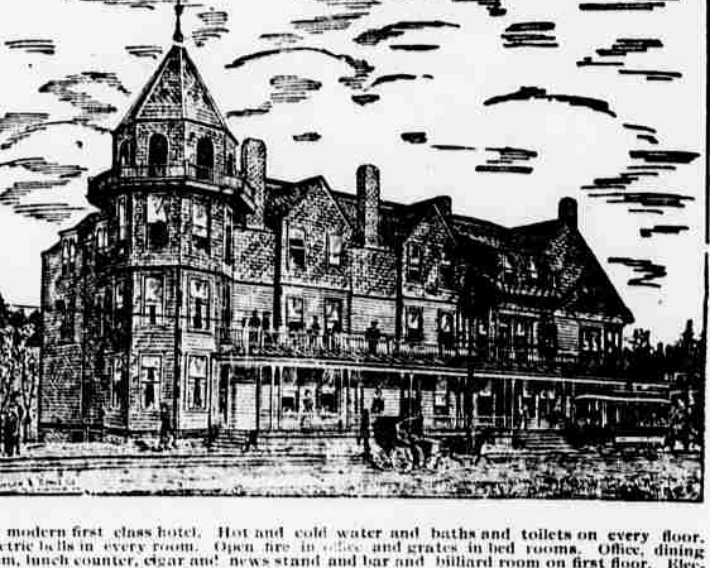
