ALIENS HOLD 21,000,000 ACRES OF OUR LAND.

THEY ENCROACH ON THE RIGHTS OF THE HOMESTEADER. PROCEEDINGS IN THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, August 27.-Interesting acts and statistics are contained in the locuments accompanying the bill to prohibit aliens from bereafter acquiring lands

within the United States. The house committee on the judiciary, when it reported this measure, declared that it had obtained satisfactory evidence that titled aliens, chiefly Englishmen, nov own about 21,000,000 acres in this coun ry. To this ownership should be added that of the untitled aliens, which is usually in smaller lots and less a sub-ect of criticism. Besides this direct ownership, European capitalists have normous sums invested in railroad and land honds, covering it is thought, 100, 000,000 acres and subject to foreclosure

While this heavy alien ownership is stly in lands of the far West, it is not The case of Mr Scully is cited, who ives in England and owns and rents 90,-000 acres in Illinois, at about \$200,000 a year; while a much smaller estate within the city limits of Pittsburgh and
