

EWART IS A LAWYER.

WITHOUT FEE AND AN OFFICER, HOWEVER.

So His Organ Says, but That Statement Does Not Make the Republican Candidate Eligible for Membership in the Alliance.

"EWART AND THE ALLIANCE." "Under the above caption THE CITIZEN of to-day, [Monday] charges Mr. Ewart as being made a member of the farmers' alliance while he was ineligible to become a member on account of being a lawyer.

"We are fully prepared to dispute this statement. As a matter of fact Mr. Ewart had closed his law office before the farmers' alliance was organized in Henderson county, and has not received a fee for practicing since that time. As to the insinuation that Mr. Ewart intentionally attempted to deceive the alliance and forest himself into that body, we can only indulge a feeling of sincere pity for the authors of such vain story—it will not succeed in deceiving even the most blind, obtuse democrat—prejudiced as he may be."

Mr. Ewart and his Asheville—not organ—but tin whistle would best get together and find a consistent basis for denial of what THE CITIZEN charges. It is reported on better authority than the Farmer and Mechanic that when Mr. Ewart as a lawyer and a member of the alliance, was asked if he had surrendered his title as a lawyer he said: "No, I didn't have to," meaning apparently that he had bluffed down all opposition and carried his name into membership of the alliance with sheer force of check. If this is not true THE CITIZEN will correct it when so informed on good authority.

Anyway, the F. & M. denies nothing but that Mr. Ewart's law office is closed and that he has not received a fee of late. Those two facts, it must be conceded, do not make a fit candidate for the alliance out of H. G. Ewart. Moreover a lawyer without a practice is of the least desirable kind for the alliance; his capacities for mischief making—having all his time on his hands—are too great to make him a worthy representative of the farmers' interests.

Will Mr. Ewart and the F. & M.—though it does not matter about the last named—kindly cast an eye at this from the Country Homes, organ of the alliance in this locality:

THE CITIZEN.

"Both the democratic and republican congressional conventions for the Ninth district have been held. At Waynesville, Aug. 20th, Hamilton G. Ewart, of Henderson county, was nominated by the republican party, and at Asheville, August 27th, Wm. T. Crawford of Haywood county, was nominated by the democratic party. The Country Homes being non-partisan in politics has no comment to make on either, save that they are both talented young lawyers; but as the organ of the alliance in this district it denies the statement which has been circulated that they are members of the order. The constitution of the farmers' alliance does not admit the legal profession to their own statements, hence if a sub-aliance acts contrary to its form of government in any particular it is the duty of the state alliance to take away its charter, and any person joining the order in violation of the constitution is an impostor, and is by no means recognized as a member by those who are in fact and in truth sincere members of the order. We publish this not only in due respect for the injustice done the candidates, as no gentleman would force his name on any organization simply for the sake of self-aggrandisement, but also to correct a misrepresentation, and set the minds of the people aright upon the alliance. It is far above condescending to take any one into the order who is known to be ineligible on account of his business, profession or otherwise, or catering to the sentimentality of any man or party. When an alliance does violate its constitution it does not only have to surrender the charter, but its members should be subject to the severest criticisms and liable to expulsion. As yet we have heard of no alliance candidate or any member of the order who is in the field for this position against the nominees."

In the only speech which THE CITIZEN has reported of W. T. Crawford, he frankly stated that he was not a member of the alliance.

The Rifle Contest.

The score which appeared in yesterday's issue was that of the shot gun club instead of the rifle team. The following is the correct score of the rifle shooting:

THE SULPHUR SPRINGS.

Work Being Rapidly Pushed on the Extension to the Hotel.

Work on the extension of the Asheville Sulphur Springs hotel is going ahead with a rush. A large force of men are at work on the walls and roof. The west wall is entirely completed and the other three sides nearly so. Work on the roof has been commenced, and as soon as this is finished, a still larger number of hands will be put at work and the building will be completed by about December 1st.

Upper and lower verandas will extend around the entire front and ends of the building, making over one thousand feet in all, five hundred feet of it being contiguous with the original building and will be the same height, three stories, and is 173 feet long. It will contain sixty-six rooms, and each room will get the benefit of the sun a part of the day.

The position of the building is such, that during the winter a person can sit on the veranda and get the full rays of the sun, and be perfectly screened from the cold north and west winds. In the summer, the large oak trees entirely shade the space in front of the hotel, making a delightful place to swing under the trees in hammocks, or sit on the verandas. Dr. A. Von Ruck has secured a prize in this place for a sanitarium, as a more favorable location or better surroundings would be impossible to find. The scenery, as every one who has visited the place knows, is beautiful beyond all description. The hotel is situated in the center of the basin of all the mountain ranges and in every direction can be seen grand and picturesque peaks, Mount Mitchell, Mount Pisgah and hundreds of smaller ones. Vanderbilt's is in plain view, and for miles around imposing scenery is spread out like a panorama.

As soon as the hotel is finished work will commence on the electric railway, which will run over the new bridge at the mouth of the Swannanoa and then up the French Broad valley to the hotel. There will also be a road for carriages along the river and it will make one of the nicest drives to be found anywhere around Asheville.
