### THE SULPHUR SPRINGS.

Work Being Rapidly Pushed or the Extension to the Hotel.

Work on the extension of the Asheville Sulphur Springs hotel is going ahead with a rush. A large force of men are at wall is entirely completed and the other three sides nearly so. Work on the roof is finished, a still larger number of hands will be put at work and the building will be completed by about December 1st.

Upper and lower verandas will extend round the entire front and ends of the milding, making over one thousand fee in all, five hundred feet of it being contin ous.
