COTTON AVERAGES.

air Condition of the Crop Re Washington, Sept. 10.-The statisti

al returns to the department of agriculture for September, show a less faorable situation for cotton than those of August. On the Atlantic coast rains following a season of drought caused rust and shedding leaves and fruit. The local returns from North Carolina show that the average condi-tion is but slightly lowered because of the heavy rains and cool night. The high condition of Tennessee is well maintained and the crop is still growing maintained and the crop is still growing and fruiting. In Mississippi the rains in July and early in August, caused a logal injury, not so severe however as in the more eastern states. Louisiana reports improvement and the average condition for the state is higher, not with standing munds tells it to do, unless Matthew for the state is higher, notwithstanding some local reductions. The Arkansas average is also slightly advanced. as suffered from the drought in the cen tral and western counties which was re-ported last month. The general average is reduced from 89.5 to 85.5 which is a

fraction lower than the record of Septemrraction lower than the record of september, 1889.

State averages: Virginia, 93; North Carolina, 95; South Carolina, 87; Georgia, 86; Florida, 90; Alabama, 84; Mississippi, 87; Louisiana, 93; Texas, 77.

SHOT AT AS RIOTERS SERIOUS TROUBLE AT SOUTH AMPTON.

Sirtkers Defy the Local Authori ties and are Dispersed at the Point of the Bayonet-The May or Beseiged.

SOUTHAMPTON, Sept. 10.-The striker nade a riotous demonstration last nigh and were only dispersed at the point of the bayonet.

The trouble began with the dock labor ers preventing the departure of the trains The strikers also beseiged the gates of the dock and prevented the entrance of

the officials. Two companies of it

fantry arrived in the evening an drove the mob away from the rails. The dockmen made some desperate at tempts to break the line formed by th roops. Some of them took horses from abs standing near by and mounting Prohibition Denounced as No charged furiously upon the soldiers. The troops, however, stood firm and repeat edly repulsed the strikers. A number of horses were bayoneted and some of the riders were seriously wounded. By this time the crowd had been greatly aug-mented and volley after volley of stones were hurled at the troops. One lieuten-ant had the bridge of his nose broken by a stone, and two others were severely in-

At this inneture the mayor appeare apon the scene and read the riot act This only added to the fury of the mob section of which stormed the mayor business premises and smashed ever window in the place. The troops wer now supplied with ball cartridges, eac now supplied with ball cartrages, each man receiving twenty rounds. The mol still keeping up the attack, the soldiers were ordered to charge, and the whok line advanced mon the crowd with fixed bayonet. For a moment the mob made show of resistance, but seeing many o their number fall, pierced by the bayonet of the soldiers, the mob-broke and fled i wild disorder.
