> HOW TO GET DIRECT TRADE WITH EUROPE.

#### NOTABLE CONVENTION AT ATLANTA.

ATLANTA, Sept. 11 .- A convention of delegates from the southern states to consider the question of direct trade from southern ports to Europe met yesterday. Delegates were present from North Carolina, South Carolina, Forida, Tennessee Alabama and Georgia, Govs. Fowle, of North Carolina; Fleming, of Florida and Gordon, of Georgia, haded their respective delegations. The convention was called at the suggestion of the Georgin state alliance.

The convention organized with Col. W

The convention organized with Co. N.
J. Northern, democratic nominee for governor of Georgia, as president. Vicepresidents were chosen as follows:
North Carolina, Gov. Powle; Plorida,

icorge Fleming; South Carolina, M. L. Jonaldson; Alabama, C. M. Shelly; Ten-essee, T. F. Tillman. At the afternoon session the committee At the afternoon session the committee on plan of action made its report through its chairman, Gov. Fowle. The report favored the adoption of the resolutions introduced by Hon. Gazaway Hartridge, of Savannah, Ga., which recite that the South Atlantic and Gulf ports have not received adequate appropriations for rivers and harbors, and upper months weathers. urge upon the senators and representa-tives from the south the "necessity of se curing such appropriations as are necessay for the speedy improvement of the harbors of said ports."

The following resolutions were also re-

orted by the committee: "Resolved, That this committee recommend to the convention the creation of corporation to promote direct trade at some point on the South Atlantic coast and another to promote direct trade at some gulf port. Each company to be capitalized at \$1,000,000 with power to increase to \$10,000,000. The committee

After the box or other means shall have seen provided, each and every democrate or other voter pledging himself to sup-ort the nominess of the democratic sarty, shall be allowed to cast one vote or a candidate for each of the county slices and one vote each for two candilates for the legislature. The votes may be either written or printed on one piece of paper or separately as the judges may

letermine before the voting begins. Second. The polls should be kept open rom 10 o'clock a. m. till 5 o'clock p. m., from 10 o'clock a. m. till 5 o'clock p. m., or later if the judges think it advisable or necessary, to give every voter in the township who desires to do so an op-

Washington, Sept. 11.-In closing he debate on the tariff bill yesterday Senator Vance said he knew that his ac tion was helpless. It had already been decided that the bill was to pass. The dispatch above mentioned further says that when Captain Dorilleo and Captain Pitts read to Barrundia the order for his delivery to the Guatemahan authorities Barrundia asked permission to change his clothes, which was granted. Turning away Barrundia suddenly grasped two revolvers and fired on Do rilleo, Pitts and and a policeman, who in return fired on Barrundia, killing him.
