#### THE HEAD OF THE CORNER. SERMON BY J. D. ROBERSON VESTERDAY.

Why Do so Many of the Presen Day Reject Christ, is the All-Im portant and Momentous Ques tion—More Bludy of God's Word Needed.

Rev. J. D. Roberson preached the following sermon at the Methodist Episcopal church, corner Buttrick and Haywood streets, yesterday:

Luke 20:17—What is this then that is written, The stone which the builders reject d the same is become the head of the corner? These words were uttered during th stirring scenes and solemn deeds of the week in which Christ was put to death. On Sunday he makes the triumphalentry into holy city. On the crest of the Mount Olives he pauses; the only one of all history to stop a triumphal procession to weep in pity for his enemies. He goes straight to the temple, views it in all its parts and then as he had done in the beginning of his ministry he cleanses it of the vile horde of traders that defile the sanctuary of God. He spends Monday and Tuesday teaching and preaching the gospel and in debate with the learned and rulers in Jerusalem. He completely foils the efforts of all his assailants to entrap the efforts of all his assailants to entrap. Him in his words until no man durst ass. Him any more questions. Tuesday evening He makes His last exit from the temple; it was the last time the holy feet of the Son of God walked upon the sacred floors of that building. The glory of the house departed, it was left desolate. Just before He passed the gate He paused by the the treasury and beheld the givers casting in their offering. Christ's eye is always on the treasury on is cause. He saw the poor widow cast ins cause. He saw the poor widow cust in the two mites and observed what she had left. God's Son eyes what is left as what is given. Jesus commended the widow. She was no fanatic, she gave her living and yet she lived.

It was during this day that the solemn parable of the wicked husbandman who maitreated the servants of the lord of the vineyard and finally destroyed his son was spoken. The Pharisees perceived that it was spoken against them, and that the miserable destruction in the parable pointed to their own awful doom and they cry out, "God forbid." Christ answers, "What is this then that is written. The stone which the builders re jected, the same is become the head of th

There are these thoughts suggested by this text that I wish to emphasize. Christ's deference for the holy scrip tures. In his home and in the synagogia at Nazareth he had studied the holy at Nazareth he had studied the holy word. In the great temptation in the wilderness he holed his foe in every con-flict with an atterance of what wa-written. During the great debates of passion weak he always repelled his op-ponents by a reference to the scriptures. His commands are "Search the Scrip-tures," "Give thyself to reading, "Study to show thyself a workman," One of the needs of this age is more study of God's word, with a purpose to study of God's word, with a purpose to do its teachings. How many make the reading of the word a matter of conscious duty? How many have rules and hours for its study. Do we count it a su-to neglect the word, as to fail to pray or observe the Sabbath or to be or defran-or drink? Read, study and do the word. The text speaks of the "Rejection of

Christ." Strange-stadeed that this beau-tiful polished stone should be refused. Why was it so? The prophets through all the ages had pointed to his coming. They had described almost every event of his wonderful life. How and when and where born, the virgin mother, flight to Egypt, return to Nazareth, the gifts of the wise from the east, his journey, toil, suffering, his arrest, trial, death, burial, resursection. He came filling their predictions, yet he was "despised and rejected" of men.

His miracles were wrought before the cyes of the world. They were wonderful, benificent, simple, credible, and yet they failed to convince the incredulous Jew. He came to his own and his own received him not. His life for the beauty of holiness was unequaled by anything ever seen on earth before. Towering in normal beauty high above all the bright examples of pure and holy lives that had ever graced the globe. His words had in them life and power, "He spake as never man spake;" his utterances were protound, original, simple, lofty. He stirred up no strife and raised no sedition. yet when the Jew saw him he had no comeliness that they should desire him. comeliness that they should desire him. The puzzle yet remains why they rejected him. But above this rises an all important and momentous question, why do so many of the present day reject him? Who can tell us? It is the problem of the ages. Twenty-five million adults in the United States, in the land of boasted religious light, who own Christ as divine and the Saviour of men, the boasted religious light, who own Christ as divine and the Saviour of men, the Bible inspired and teaching the will of God, who believe in a hell and heaven and a coming judgment and yet these millions are without hope and without God in the world. What explains this wholesale drifting from God? The Bible. Man's heart is set to do evil. He loves sin. It is in his fallen nature. He loves darkness rather than light. It requires a strong determined effort of will never strong determined effort of will power

and has grown through all the centuries. Kings and rulers have set themselves against the Lord's anointed. Mighty armies have arrayed themselves against the church of the living God. But that church is stronger to-day than ever before, with the glorious promise that it shall fill the whole earth. We need have no fears that the cause of Christ will fail. no fears that the cause of Christ will fail. The great question that concerns us is, Are we rejecting Christ? Do we receive his word and obey his commands? We cannot respect him in the same sense the Jews did. We cannot arrest, try and condemn and crucify him as they did. We can drive no nails in his hands or spikes in his feet, but we can wound or hurt his cause. We can drive nails in the hands, spikes in the feet and lance in the heart of his cause. His cause is dearer to heart of his cause. His cause is dearer to him than hand or foot or heart. He gave his hand, head and heart to be bruised, ns nand, head and heart to be bruised, cut, torn, mangled, that his cause might prosper. Oh, wound not the cause of God by open sin or carless living. Let your light be bright, your cross daily borne, your soul filled with all the fulness of God.

At an early day Mrs. Fitch, president of the Union will call a meeting of the servants of the city and will form a union of them. This organization will be to the protection of the servants. No girl who cannot furnish satisfactory references will be admitted into the union.
