NOMINATED TO-DAY.

HARMONIOUS AND ENTHUSIASTIC CONVENTION.

A LIST OF CANDIDATES EVERY-ONE CAN VOTE FOR.

Representatives, J. P. LOWRY, M. L. REED, D. L. REYNOLDS, J. L. CATHY, J. MACKAY, J. H. COURTNEY, L. B. McBRAYER, A. H. STARNES.

Mr. Lowry stated that he would withdraw in favor of Cathey. On motion, Mr. Cathey's nomination was made unanimous by acclamation.

FOR THE LEGISLATURE. Candidates for the legislature being the next to be nominated, Mr. J. W. Starnes placed in nomination M. L. Reed, and his nomination was made unanimous by acclamation.

Mr. Reuben McBrayer placed in nomination Dr. J. S. T. Baird, one of the representatives of the last legislature.

Col. A. T. Davidson placed in nomination W. H. Curtis, of Huminy.

Mr. T. W. Naah placed J. P. Lowry, of Sandy Mush, in nomination.

Mr. Locke Craig was placed in nomination by Mr. Pleas Israel, and his nomination was seconded by Mr. E. D. Carter, who made a strong speech in favor of Mr. Craig.

Mr. D. A. Blackwell second the nomination of Mr. Curtis, and J. M. Ledford that of Dr. Baird.

Mr. E. L. Henry placed J. R. Dubose in nomination, and J. H. Cooper placed W. P. Chesborough in nomination.

J. P. Lowry was nominated on the fourth ballot.

PREPARED FOR A STRIKE.

A Gas and Coke Company Expect a Strike and is Prepared.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—The directors of the London gas light and coke company continue their preparation to guard against the stoppage of their works in consequence of possible trouble between them and their employers. Barracks have been built at Beckton to shelter non-union employees and the cavalry and infantry. The company has enough coal stored to meet its requirements for ten weeks.

The strikers reiterate their statement that they never intended to strike.

REG WRECK.

One Man Killed and Probably Several Wounded.

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 4.—News has been received here of a serious wreck on the Northern Pacific railroad near this city. Engineer Frank Mack was killed and fireman Chislett was badly injured. It is reported that the passengers fared badly.

Visible Cotton.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The total visible supply of cotton for the world is 1,431,244 bales of which 959,144 is American. Receipts at all interior towns, 132,730 bales; receipts at plantations, 271,705 bales; crop in sight, 969,205 bales.

Not Startling News.

BOISE CITY, Idaho, Oct. 4.—Returns from all but three counties in the state give the entire republican state ticket over 2,000 majority. The republicans have elected forty-four out of the fifty-four members of the legislature.

FOR WINTER WORK.

Attractive Program of the Y. M. C. A.

The winter work of the Young Men's Christian Association opened last night with a reception to the young men of the association and their friends.

The first number on the program, an instrumental trio, arranged for the piano and first and second violins, was rendered by Mr. D. W. Bissell and Messrs. W. E. and Geo. R. Collins. Mr. Anderson then introduced the speaker of the evening, Mr. P. P. Claxton, with the subject, "How to spend our winter evenings."

Mr. Claxton treated his subject in his usual earnest, vigorous and convincing manner, emphasizing first the importance of the few leisure hours that every man, and particularly every young man has, in moulding and shaping his character for good or evil, and made some practical and useful suggestions for spending that time most profitably.

WHERE, WHERE IS EWART?

SOMEBODY GET OUT A SEARCH WARRANT.

If any Good Republican has Ewart Concealed About His Person Now is the Time to Produce Him—Queer "Joint Debate."

LOGAN'S STORE, Rutherford county, Oct. 1.—Mr. Ewart was absent again to-day. It looks as if he had finally bolted the campaign, and if he does not turn up to-morrow at Rutherfordton, we think it would be in order for the republicans to put out a candidate to represent them in this district.

There was a fine crowd present yesterday at Dyrastville, the last appointment in McDowell, and Crawford gave Ewart's substitute, Mr. Spencer Blackburn, a handsome currying. Blackburn is a clever young fellow, but knows nothing whatever of national politics, and would have been much better employed if he had been conducting his campaign against Will Newland, the democratic candidate for solicitor. He will certainly need all the votes he can get in order to make even a respectable sum against Newland, who will no doubt beat him by a handsome majority.

A SPECIAL TOAST.

Some of the best democrats in McDowell county are at the Dyrastville precinct. We took dinner with the Hemphill brothers, and they are as thoroughly hospitable as they are democratic. They mix a little corn whiskey with their enthusiasm, and without having some fine sentiments which they give expression to on special occasions. For instance: Just before dinner the old old gentleman, John Hemphill, went to take his usual "nip," and before drinking announced this toast: "Fear God, hate sin, keep clean and love the women!"

Last night we spent with James Andrews, Esq., of Cane Creek, this county, a red hot democrat of the old school. This morning we drove to this place, and despite the threatening weather, the largest crowd met us which has been present at any appointment outside of Barnwell and Marion. There are about 400 voters in this district, and at least 300 of them were present to-day. Universal displeasure was expressed at Ewart's failure to put in an appearance.

CRAWFORD IN FINE FORM.

No building being at hand large enough to accommodate the crowd, Crawford spoke in the open air and for over two hours held the closest attention of his large audience. His speech was the finest logical effort he has made in the canvass. He literally tore every vestige of the mask from the republican party, and stood it before the people with all its hypocrisy laid bare. There were numbers of republicans even who came to hear from Mr. Ewart why he had not fulfilled the promises made two years ago when he declared that if the people would elect him to congress, put Harrison in the white house, and thus give the republicans control of the government, they would repeal the internal revenue law, pass the Blair educational bill, give free coinage of silver, and reduce the taxes upon the necessities of life to the people.

It was a most cringing review of their failure to do any of these things which Crawford made to-day, and there is no doubt about his having made a number of votes.

WHERE'S EWART?

The democrats of this township are confident that the small majority given Johnston at the last election will be increased into a handsome one for Crawford.

To-night we are stopping with that enthusiastic democrat, Thomas Jefferson Hampton, who says that he will always promise his wife that he will not take part in the campaign, but he can never keep his promise.

To-morrow we go to Rutherfordton, and if we do not find Ewart we are thinking of offering a thousand dollars reward for his delivery into Crawford's hands on any stump in the district, with his throat in good condition. J. P. K.

AFFAIRS OF CONSEQUENCE.

FOREIGN.

The national gas workers' union of London has demanded that the London Gas Light and Coke company, which has a capital of £12,000,000 and employs 11,000 men, shall employ only union men.

WASHINGTON.

Washington dispatches call attention to the want of vigor in the democratic preparations for the congressional campaign and the activity displayed by the republicans.

Secretary Tracy has awarded contracts for two battleships and the 7,300 ton cruiser to the Cramps, of Philadelphia, and for the other battleship to the Union Iron Works, San Francisco.

Postoffice department officials deny that Postmaster-General Wamsamaker has violated the law in his letter to an Alabama newspaper. The postmaster sent out an unofficial letter in an official envelope and unstamped.

HOME.

Wm. Garrett Brown, of Marion, Ala., wins the highest scholarship prize at Harvard College.

It is thought in New York the prospects for the success of the Irish famine fund are excellent.

Judge Waddill, republican, positively declines to be a candidate for re-election to congress in the Richmond district.

At a meeting of Hebrews in New York it was decided that the solution of the Russian Jewish trouble was in emigration to Palestine.

The national civil service reform league at Boston yesterday adopted resolutions criticizing the republican administration of the civil service law.

The New York Central railroad company issued a general order announcing that it objects to its employes being members of the Knights of Labor.

The general soundness of trade is shown by the reports of failures, which for the third quarter in 1890 are smaller in number than for the same quarter last year.

"Fighting Bob" Kennedy has had 60,000 copies of his speech on Quay and the senate printed, and will distribute them with a lavish hand to Pennsylvania voters.

William Doyle, section hand on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, was struck by an open door of a passing car in 1888, and a month later died. A jury at Iowa City awarded \$10,000 damages in a verdict against the company.
