



HIS DEATH OCCURED SATUR DAY NIGHT.

One of Asheville's Most Promi nent Physicians-A Man Whose LOSS Will Be Greatly Felt-The Funeral Takes Place This After

Dr. W. L. Hilliard is dead. His death ccured Saturday evening at 7 o'clock, at his home, on south Main street. Dr Hilliard had been sick for about two weeks. He was first attacked with a cold and a week ago yesterday morning was stricken by partial paralysis. He became unconscious, and up to the time of his death did not recognize any one. He was unable to speak, nor could be swallow anything. He suffered no apparent pain and death came quietly and

his bedside. Dr. Hilliard was one of the best known men of Asheville. He was almost 67 years old, having been born November 3, 1823. He was a native of Hall county

He loved his profession and de-voted all the powers of mind and body to the relief of the sick and suffering, and seeking that pleasure which best suited his generous disposition in following in the footsteps of Him "who went about doing zood."

His profession was cho en when his manhood began, and his life was devoted to it with untiring love and devotion, which induced him, amid the fatigues of him it can be truthfully be said, his skill was as promptly placed at the command of the poorest man in this county, as when summoned to the bedside of a wealthy patient. Probably no man has

wealthy patient. Probably no man has ever done a larger proportion of absolutely gratisitous practice than he. While characterized by strong and decided opinions, Dr. Hilliard had a heart of gentleness and full of sympathy with the sick and afflicted, and many, very many households in Buncombe county to-day grieve as though one of their own loved ones had been taken away. He was a man of strong friendship and was a friend to be depended upon. At the same time he did not easily forget an injury.

When Asheville was a small place be was family physician to a number of the best known families here and the majorbest known families here and the major-ity of these to whom he had rendered his skillful and tender services for many years clung to him when the place grew to be a city and would have no one else. Dr. Hilliard's death takes from Asheville a citizen whose loss will be deeply felt and whose place it will be hard to fill. The funeral took place at the Church street Methodist church this afternoon at 4 30. The interment was at Riverside cemetery.

The main line of the Baltimore & Ohio is also blocked, and the Chicago express stuck on the Bellaire bridge over the Ohio. Other roads suffered proportionately.
