

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20.-The Mayor and City Council appointed a Committee of Safety of fifty citizens to investigate the assassination of Chief of Police Hennessey and to take steps to suppress the that you will be charged a Mafia and the vencetta. The police last night arrested forty odd Italians at the grocery of Carlo Grafferio. Officers noticed a large number of Italtians dropping into the place in twos and threes, and believing that something was wrong, forced their way in and found a man addressing the crowd prest ent in Italian. Charging that it was an unlawful meeting all persons present were arrested and carried to the jail.

When the prisoners were brought to the station it was discovered that not one had a cent or a home of any kind and that they had arrived yesterday from to meet at Grafferio's place. As the pris-oners could give no explanation of themselves or why they had come New Or-leans or met at the grocery they were locked up charged with being dangerous,

suspicious characters.

The police also arrested Manuel Peitro, whom they charged with being one of the men who fired the fatal shot that killed Chief of Police Hennessey. They claim to have all the murderers now with sufficient exidence to consider them. claim to have all the murderers now with sufficient evidence to convict them. According to them the murder was ordered by the Matrangs, who are heads of the Sicilian gang. Joe Machica, under the name of John Peterson, leased the Mastero house from which the assassins watched Hennessy and finally fired on him. The murder itself was committed by six or seven men of whom Schaffed. Mastero, Bagnetto, Incardira and Pettro were five. The other Italian prisoners, except some few regarded as important witnesses or accessories to the crime. witnesses or accessories to the crime have been released.
