## THE NEWS!

### EX-GOV. PATTISON'S LIBEL SUIT STARTED.

HE EVIDENTLY MEANS BUSINESS FROM THE START.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Oct. 28.—Warrants in the libel suit of ex-Governor Pattison against W. F. Jordan, proprietor, and J. J. McClellin, editor of the Morning Call of this city, were served this morning by a constable from Philadelphia. Both defendants waived hearing and gave bail in the sum of \$1,500, each for their appearance at the quarter sessions of court in Philadelphia. Col. W. P. Small furnished security.

At the hearing yesterday before Magistrate O'Brien in the criminal libel case of ex-Governor Robert E. Pattison, Chas. H. Heistis, editor of the Inquirer, was the only one of the defendants present. At the conclusion of the testimony offered against Heistis, the magistrate held him in \$500. The counsel for Heistis and Elverson consented that the evidence offered against the former should also be considered as having been offered against Elverson, despite his absence, and consequently bail in \$1,500 was furnished for his appearance at court. Ex-Governor Pattison, ex-state senator Judge J. G. Gordon, and Wm. S. Stenger, ex-secretary of state, swore that every allegation published in the article complained of was false.

### WILLIAM VON MOLTKE.

A Man With no Record Praised a Great One.

BERLIN, Oct. 28.—Emperor William, in addressing general field marshal, Count Von Moltke at a gathering of staff officers yesterday, said:

"I thank you in the name of those who fought together with you, for all you have done for my house and the greatness of the fatherland. I greet you as a leader who has excited in the army a spirit of invincibility. The presence of the King of Saxony on this occasion recalls the time when he and you fought for Germany's greatness. All here feel gratitude to the chief who has not been content to stand alone in his greatness, but who has been active in forming a school for army leaders for all time to come."

### BIRCHALL'S MOTHER.

Anything to Save Her Boy From Hanging.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 28.—A cable dispatch from Sir Charles Tupper announces the fact that he has forwarded the petition for the commutation of the death sentence of Birchall, the murderer of P. C. Beaudry. The petition was got up in England by the family of the condemned man. In response to an inquiry from Mrs. Birchall, deputy Minister of Justice Sedgwick has written to her that the Canadian petition may be presented as late as Nov. 5, and by herself if she so desires.

### KILLED BY THE CAR.

A Locomotive Runs Into a Party of Five.

STEELEVILLE, Ohio, Oct. 28.—East bound No. 6, a Panhandle passenger train, ran into five persons walking on the track midway between here and Mingo at 6 o'clock last evening. Mrs. Blackburn was killed instantly. Mrs. Mary Wirt was hurt internally and will die, and Joshua Wind had his back broken.

### WHITE ON GREEN.

Three Weeks Earlier Than Usual is the Snow.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 28.—Reports received here show that a considerable quantity of snow fell in the mountains last night. Two to four inches are reported at Cranberry. This is about two or three weeks earlier than usual for snow in the mountains. In some places the snow has fallen on green leaves.

### IS IT ILLEGAL?

LAWRENCE, Mass., Oct. 28.—Lawrence has, under its poll tax law, a registration controversy of general interest because the question involved applies to every city in Massachusetts. It seems that the poll taxes of several hundred persons have been paid from a fund deposited with the city treasurer by the democratic local managers. The republicans claim that these names have all been placed on the list illegally under the state constitution and will carry the matter to the courts.

### \$100,000 FIRE.

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 28.—A fire in the George Weikman brewing company's establishment in Newport, Ky., last night destroyed a large warehouse containing 100,000 bushels of barley and malt. The loss is estimated at \$100,000; fully insured.

### Balfour in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Oct. 28.—The Freeman's Journal says: "Balfour has been received everywhere without demonstrations either hostile or friendly. He must not mistake civility for servility or like his predecessors, he will find that he has built his hopes on sand."

### Trouble in Switzerland.

BERNE, Oct. 28.—The troubles between the liberals and conservatives in the canton of Ticino have broken out afresh and further disorders have occurred. Another battalion of troops has been dispatched to the canton to assist in restoring order.

### The Criminal Court.

In the criminal court yesterday afternoon the case of Monroe Baumgartner and Jos. Suddruth for an affray at the Glen Rock hotel was called, Baumgartner submitted and was fined \$25. Suddruth was found guilty and fined \$100. Joseph Holson, white, and J. Forney, colored, for an affray were found not guilty.

This morning Lee Alexander was found guilty of an affray and was fined \$15 and costs. The court having disposed of all the cases on the docket ready for trial adjourned at 10:45 until 2 o'clock to await action of the grand jury.

#### VACILLATING EWART.

Has He at Last Signed the Alliance Demands?

After declaring that never, never would he sign the alliance demands Ewart has at last done so. At least it is reported. A prominent republican, it is said, has in his possession the demands signed "H. G. Ewart," and it seems likely that the man of all others declared by a prominent alliance officer to be out of sympathy with the alliance movement has sacrificed himself and sacrificed an everlasting reputation for not knowing his own mind.

#### THE FINAL RESULT.

Asheville Has 2,067 Registered Voters.

The registration books in the west ward showed 1,197 names at the final close of registration Saturday night. Of these 886 were of white voters and 281 of colored. The total in 1888 was 977, 688 white and 289 colored. The total registration in the two wards this year is 2,067—1,115 white and 649 colored. The total number in 1888 was 1,794—1,139 whites and 565 colored. This year's registration shows a marked increase in the population of Asheville.

#### Bitten by a Mad Dog.

On Friday last little Cora Alice, the eight-year-old daughter of E. L. Hummout, of Mors Hill, was badly bitten by a dog believed to be mad. Her father is unable to defray her expenses to New York to be treated in the Pasteur hospital and asks for assistance. The facts in the case are certified to by T. M. Hafham, principal of Mors Hill high school, and by Lafayette Whittingham, M. D., of the same place. The child, with her father, is now at the Carolina house.

#### AFFAIRS OF CONSEQUENCE.

#### FOREIGN.

There was a slight fall of snow throughout England Sunday.

An Italian East Africa company has been formed with a capital of \$4,000,000 guaranteed by the government.

Troubles have arisen between Hirsch, the American minister at Constantinople, and the Porte, over the unjust arrest of an American subject on suspicion of being implicated in the Armenian revolution.

Germany has made renewed efforts to obtain concerted action by the European powers against the new United States tariff bill, but her overtures in this direction have been coldly received by the French government.

#### HOUSE.

New York city has this year 245,164 registered voters.

Mr. Blaine will speak in Philadelphia next Saturday night.

Alderman Wm. P. Wheeler, of Chicago, was shot at and fatally wounded Sunday by Geo. H. Hattaway, a gambler.

The printing presses were running all Sunday in New York to supply the necessary official ballots for the coming election.

A small band of Arizona Apache Indians is terrorizing settlers along the Arizona New Mexico line. Thus far four persons have been murdered by the gang.

The Hudson showed yesterday at Rondout, N. Y., the highest tide in forty years. The brickyards suffered enormously, millions of brick being lost.

### GUDGER AND DEMENS.

#### THEY SPEAK AT THE COURT HOUSE.

A Good Crowd in Attendance—Mr. Gudger Makes a Strong and Eloquent Speech—Maj. Rollins Not Present.

There was a large crowd at the court house last night, to hear the joint discussion between Hon. H. A. Gudger and Messrs. W. W. Rollins and P. A. Demens. As usual the republican side of the house was filled for the most part with negroes. Mr. Gudger, who had the right of first appointment, spoke first. He made an excellent talk and was enthusiastically and repeatedly cheered.

#### VICTORY FOR THE DEMOCRATS.

Mr. Gudger began by saying that he had recently been in a large number of the counties of the state and that he had never seen the democratic party in better trim than it now is. He predicted that the Ninth congressional district, which he said had so long been misrepresented, would be carried by a majority of 2,000 if not 2,500 democratic votes, and that the people would no longer have any cause for shame in alluding to their representation in congress.

Mr. Gudger referred to the broken promises of the republican party and said it had broken every pledge made since its conception. "Two years ago," he said, "Bridgland and Ewart expected the benefits of the Blair bill and promised that if the republican party were to succeed it would pass and school houses would be erected on every hill and schools be taught in the whole country. Yet they had the presidency, the senate and the house of representatives, absolute control, and have failed to carry out the promise. This is only one of many failures."

Mr. Gudger also spoke of the internal revenue law, which he said Mr. Ewart had promised, if elected and the republicans had a majority, to repeal. This he said had not been done. "There is but one promise which they have redeemed," continued the speaker, "that is the one to reduce the surplus. They found millions and millions of money in the treasury and cannot show where it has gone."

#### BIBERY AND CORRUPTION.

As to the state politics, Mr. Gudger spoke of the only time in which the republicans have had control of the state, 1868 and 1869, and said that in those days fraud was rampant and that bribery and corruption were a part and parcel of the government. He spoke of the taxes gathered in those days for the purpose of establishing schools and said that the republican legislators had put their hands in the treasury and stole the money. He then spoke of the difference in the record of the democratic party. This party, when it came into power, he said, found the walls of a penitentiary just started and the democratic legislature took it in hand and it is now on such a footing that it costs the state no money to support it, whereas before it cost \$100,000 per year.

#### THE FORCE BILL.

Mr. Gudger said the republicans had two purposes in passing the force bill. One is to carry the country republican and the other to annihilate the south. As his reason for saying that it was to carry the country republican, Mr. Gudger said that Judge Bond, who is hated in the state, had the power to appoint some despised revenue officers to supervise the elections in the state. He called on the people to rebuke such a party.

The speaker said he was in favor of the present county government because it was the plan instituted by the forefathers.

He spoke of the enormous amount of money paid out by the republican party for pensions. He said he was not opposed to all wounded soldiers having pensions but that he was against so many who did not need the money having them.

#### REASONS FOR BEING A DEMOCRAT.

As one of his reasons for being a democrat Mr. Gudger said that the democratic party pays \$50 in taxes where the republican party pays \$1 in the state of North Carolina. "The democratic party," he said, "has magnanimity enough to help educate the children of the colored race, even though the republican party did not want to do it. We educate them of our own money, for we have only taxed the republican party one dollar in fifty. Another reason for being a democrat is that I have seen 115,000 colored voters go to the polls every state election and vote the republican ticket and then have seen the democrats build institutions and go out and bring in the colored deaf, dumb and blind and feed and clothe them at the expense of the party. The democrats built an insane asylum for them. I have heard hundreds of other reasons for being a democrat."

Mr. Gudger said that next to the church the democratic party is the greatest organization in the world.

When he spoke of Grover Cleveland as the next president, the hall was filled with long and loud cheers. In closing Mr. Gudger predicted a majority in Asheville of 500 if democrats do their duty.

#### MR. DEMENS' TALK.

Mr. Demens spoke next. He said he had listened with great attention to Mr. Gudger's remarks and spoke of them as very flowery but actually declared there were "no facts or arguments in them." He said that no great country like America can be governed without two political parties and the question is "which is the best?"

Mr. Demens endeavored to show that the democratic party was not as good as the republican party because the former had "incited to find anything wrong with the books of the nation when in power." He declared that the democratic platform was "as empty and flowery as Mr. Gudger's speech." In closing Mr. Demens ventured the assertion that there were more facts and arguments in his speech, which was short, than in Mr. Gudger's. Maj. Rollins was not present and his place was not filled.

After Mr. Demens concluded Mr. G. S. Ferguson, of Waynesville, was called on. He gave glowing reports of the condition of democracy in the west. Mr. J. M. Gudger was also called on and in a short talk urged democrats to work from now till November 4.

#### A New Water Way.

FLORENCE, Ala., Oct. 28.—The government steamer Weitzel passed the city yesterday, having come through the Mussel Shoals Canal from Chattanooga.
