A DELTIA dispatch, describing an attempt to be first at an auction sale of real estate, says that a jostling crowd of men, numbering at least five hundred, pushed and scrambled for places in a land company's office from half past five o'clock at night until half past seven the next morning, eager to be "in on the ground floor for a sale of lots. 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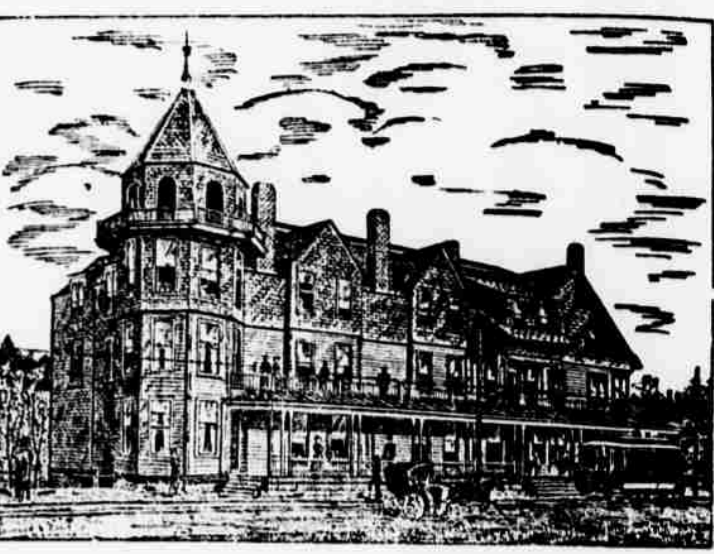
