WHOOP! 40,000! QUAY! GREAT DEMOCRATIC GAINS EVERYWHERE. PENNSYLVANIA ELECTS PATTISON BY 5,000. CANNON, OF ILLINOIS, CONCEDES HIS DEFEAT. NEXT HOUSE WILL HAVE A DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY. The next house of representatives is democratic by a good working majority, the democrats making gains everywhere. Some of the strongholds of the republicans regarded as safe for the party have gone democratic, as Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and probably Minnesota, and scattering districts throughout the Union. Knox county Tennessee, republican for years, being a notable instance of the great change in the popular feeling. Cannon, of Illinois, he of the "dirty mouth," goes into retirement. McKinley, of Ohio, may be defeated. New York city and state show great democratic gains. Congress will send some democrats to Kansas for the first time in many years—a good dose for it. Nebraska, and a democratic governor elected. Maryland is all democratic. Out of eleven congressional districts in Kentucky ten have gone democratic by increased majorities. Returns from all over Alabama indicate the usual democratic victory. Missouri gains some democratic congressmen. The New York Evening World of today estimates that the democrats will have a majority in the next congress of between 65 and 97. The Mail and Express concedes the democratic majority by "at least 60." The Evening Sun places the democratic majority at "about 53." Good-bye love hills! Minnesota—Partly Democratic. St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 5.—(By yesterday's election Governor Merriam's 24,000 majority of two years ago is reduced so greatly that there was opportunity for the democratic claim that he had been defeated. However, he is re-elected but by a greatly reduced plurality. One and possibly two of the offices shown, faces the state ticket are democratic. The legislature, so far as any reports are heard from, seems close, the republicans claiming a majority but admitting the possibility that a combination of alliance and democratic strength might control legislation in the next legislature. John Lind is undoubtedly returned from the second district having defeated General J. H. Baker the alliance-democratic candidate by a few thousand. S. G. Comstock is also surely expected in the fifth, his success having been confirmed by the inability of the alliance and democracy to unite upon a candidate. Mark H. Dammall, in the first and S. P. Snider in the fourth, have close calls and their titles to their seats is still in doubt with chances in their favor. D. L. Hall is defeated in the third by O. M. Hall, who fought his re-election on the tariff. Ohio—McKinley Gone? CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 5.—The Times-Star has a special from Canton, dated 2:30 a. m., saying that an estimate there made for 400 and 400 votes, electing Warwick, McKinley's opponent, by 144. CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—Unofficial footings show that the republicans have carried Hamilton county by majorities ranging from 62 for coroner to 9,314 for probable judge. CANTON, O., Nov. 5.—The democrats claim Warwick's election by 300. DETROIT, Nov. 5.—A telegram from Gen. Campbell, of Ohio, to Don M. Dickerson says: "The latest reports this morning indicate that McKinley and Foster are both defeated." CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 5.—A special from Canton says there is little doubt of McKinley's defeat. Illinois—Cannon Fired. DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 5.—George T. Buckin, a republican and an intimate friend of Congressman Cannon, estimates that Cannon carries Vermilion county by about 400 and Champlain county by about 100; that Buzy, democrat, carried Edgar county by about 400 and Duerglass by 240. Cook county has not been heard from. The indications are that Cannon is beaten by a small majority. DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 5.—Congressman Cannon concedes his defeat by 300. New York—Democratic Gains. NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Returns up to noon show that the democrats have elected 67 assemblymen in this state and the republicans 29. Two districts are still in doubt with the probability in favor of the republicans. To secure a majority on the joint ballot the democrats require 68, the republicans 62, as the republicans have 19 senators, the democrats 13. It looks therefore like a tie on the joint ballot. New Hampshire—Democratic Gains. CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 5.—There is no doubt McKinley, democrat, is elected to congress in the first district. The democrats claim Daniels' election in the second by 200 majority, while the republicans say Moore has over 200. The legislative is very close and its control will undoubtedly be determined by the elections held to-day. There is no choice for governor by the people and the legislature will have to elect him. The republican elected their congressional last year by 1,000 majority. The returns so far have wiped this out. Maryland—Democratic. BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—The congressional delegation is solid democratic. North Carolina—Tillman Elected. CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 5.—Total vote in the state to-day will not exceed 75,000 and Tillman is elected by not less than 25,000 majority. Kansas—Alliance. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 5.—The Farmers' Alliance has secured a victory in this state. There will be some democratic congressmen returned. Washington—Republican. SEATTLE, Nov. 3.—The indications are that Wilson, Republican, for congress will have 5,000 majority. Both branches of the legislature are republican on a joint ballot.

DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY IN NORTH CAROLINA. WE ELECT PROBABLY EVERY CONGRESSMAN. ONLY ONE DISTRICT AT ALL IN DOUBT. RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 5.—Returns are now coming in from the counties and are in most cases reported as official. Those so far received today are: Warren county, democratic gain of over 450 votes. W. W. Long elected to the house by a handsome democratic majority. Stokes county, republican, save for the sheriff, who is elected a democratic loss. Gaston—Returns from Gastonia precinct show a loss of 94 for the democrats on the congressional vote. Chowan—Republicans carry the state ticket by 125, a gain for them of 75. The legislative ticket is close and in doubt. Wilson and Tison precinct give Merrimon 205. Branch, for congress, 200 majority. Statesville, Iredell county, gives Price only 230 votes. Faircloth, republican for associate justice 275; Merrimon, 463. This is a democratic gain of 70. Salisbury, the home of Charles Price, head of the republican ticket, gives Price 241, and Merrimon 586, a democratic gain of 604. There is no doubt of the election of all the democratic candidates for congress, save Newberry in the second district. This is yet in doubt. Newberry is making a close race there. Eaves, chairman republican state committee, concedes North Carolina to the democrats by 40,000 majority—a great increase.

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KNOCKED OUT IN PENNSYLVANIA. PATTISON, DEMOCRAT, ELECTED BY 4,792. THERE IS A GAIN IN THE LEGISLATURE. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 5.—The estimated pluralities from sixty-five of the sixty-seven counties in the state give PATTISON, democrat, for governor, a net plurality of 4,792. The two missing counties, Elk and Warren, in 1886 gave a net republican plurality of 363. The election of PATTISON by over 5,000 plurality is conceded by all republican leaders and journals. The democrats have certainly gained two congressmen and the figures are so close in three other districts that the official computation may show at least one additional democratic member in the delegation, and possibly a democratic gain of four or five. The present delegation in congress stands twenty-one republicans and seven democrats. The legislature remains strictly republican although on a joint ballot the majority of 102 which that party has in the present legislature will be somewhat reduced.

TELEGRAPHIC RETURNS. How They Were Received Last Night. The telegraphic returns from the elections in the United States were received in the court house last night. Reuben McBrayer, the chairman of the democratic executive committee of this congressional district, announced them. The crowd in the court house was large and all were eager to hear the returns. Cheers and hurrahs were given as the figures were favorably to the democratic side. As they generally were read there was noticeable silence when they were otherwise. The telegraphic service was also given at the rooms of the Carolina athletic club and the returns were eagerly watched by the members. A large number of men and boys gathered on court square and seemed very jubilant over the reported success of the democratic ticket. Some of the boys procured tar barrels and had some glorious democratic bonfires.

STRIKING DOCK LABORERS. Some of them go back to Work and some don't. LONDON, Nov. 5.—The cooperative societies submitted to the directors of the dock companies provides for the establishment of piece work system to take the place of the agreement under which the men have been working for a year past, and which expired yesterday. The men generally do not favor the new scheme and much discontent exists among them. It is feared a strike will be inaugurated at any moment. Early this morning Messrs. Tillett and Man, labor leaders, visited the various dock gates and exhorted the men not to quit work. Their advice was followed in most cases and the men resumed work though in numerous instances a discontented disposition was shown by the laborers. Eight hundred men employed on the royal Victoria and Albert docks refused to work on a strike.

Electrics Before the Supreme Court. WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The United States supreme court has granted a motion to advance the case of Shilbaga Juro, who is under sentence of death by electricity in New York state and assigned the case for argument on the third Monday in November. A Bitter Labor Struggle. SCOTTSDALE, Pa., Nov. 5.—Ten thousand employees of the Frick coke company threw down their tools this morning for the reinstatement of Andrew Verotie, a discharged coke works committeeman, and a long and bitter struggle is anticipated. The World's Fair Goes. CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The first result of the election to be known for a certainty was the success of the proposition to increase the backing of the World's Fair to \$10,500,000. A \$400,000 Fire. NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., Nov. 5.—A disastrous fire raged here to-day. It started in the cellar of the Ferguson building and destroyed about \$400,000 worth of property. Col. Long's Horn. COL. T. B. LONG promised some of his friends on Tuesday, that he would arouse them from their slumber this morning with a republican horn, announcing a great vic ovy for his party. The colonel was in town this morning, and some of his friends found the horn in his pocket still unblown, and the last seen of him he was looking for a hiding place for the republican bugle.

APPAIS OF CONSEQUENCE. The cash on hand in the United States treasury has been reduced to a little over \$5,000,000. The Irish members of parliament lately arrived in this country are busily with the object of their mission. In a letter to Governor Hill, of New York, concerning his claim for a census report of New York city, Secretary Noble charges the Governor with partisan unfairness and misrepresentation. A petition transmitted from England by Sir Charles Tupper to the Governor-General of Canada, praying for executive clemency for John Reginald Brehall, has arrived at Ottawa. It contains about 300 signatures, mostly of business men and clergymen. The Ute Indians are still off their reservations and roaming through Lilly Park, Colorado, and vicinity in bands of from 40 to 100, intimidating the settlers and killing all the cattle and deer they come across simply for the hide.
