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IT GROWS!

THE DEMOCRATIC MAJORITIES INCREASING. **MIGHT AS WELL MAKE IT UNANIMOUS.** OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 6.—The returns are still meagre but they indicate the probable election of Boyd, democrat, for governor by a small plurality. The alliance candidates are looming up strong in the interior and the republican candidates are alternating between first and second places in the country towns. Complete returns may possibly elect either of the three gubernatorial candidates, but the large democratic gains in Omaha and the eastern end of the state give Boyd the best chance. The democrats gain one congressman, McKeligh, surely and probably another, Tiran. The election of Dorsey, republican, in the third district is not yet certain.

Ohio—Foster Defeated.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Meagre returns received at the republican and democratic state headquarters indicate the election of fourteen democratic congressmen. This estimate includes the defeat of McKinley in the Sixth district and Foster in the Eighth. Foster concedes the election of Hare, his opponent, by 100 majority. Both parties claim the Sixteenth district.

Illinois—Almost Democratic.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The Tribune (rep.) finds the results in the state legislature to be as follows: Senate..... REP. DEM. House..... 75 70 Joint Assembly..... 102 100 Farmers' alliance..... 2 This would make a tie vote on the joint ballot if the Farmers' alliance men should vote with the democrats, or give a majority of four should they vote with the republicans.

Virginia—Democratic.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 6.—Further returns from election in this state leave no doubt that ten democratic congressmen are elected. Democratic gains were 11-612; republican gains 1-306.

Minnesota.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 6.—The latest figures from the fifth district indicate the possible election of Halverson (alliance) over Comstock (republican) and Whitman (democrat).

Michigan—Democratic.

DETROIT, Nov. 6.—The indications are that the democrats have elected their governor by about 10,000 plurality.

New York State.

ELMIRA, N. Y., Nov. 6.—Hazen H. Rockwell (democrat) is elected representative in congress in the twenty-eighth district by less than one hundred plurality.

Arkansas—Breckenridge Elected.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 6.—Democrats claim Breckenridge election by a handsome majority. All democratic counties show heavy gains for Breckenridge.

Missouri—Very Democratic.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 6.—The democrats send a full delegation to congress with one exception; they elect the state ticket and will have a joint ballot in the legislature by a large majority.

GAIN AN U. S. SENATOR.

A DEMOCRATIC SUCCESSOR TO W. M. EVARTS. New York State Legislature Democratic on a Joint Ballot, With a Majority of Two—Democratic Claims. NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The associated press reports show the election of sixty-eight democratic assemblymen in New York state and sixty republicans. As the democrats have thirteen senators against nineteen republicans, the former will thus have on a joint ballot eighty-one votes, against the latter's seventy-nine which ensures the election of a democratic successor to Senator Everts. Moreover, the democrats claim that two assembly districts credited to the republicans—Dutchess county and Montgomery county—belong to them.

CLOSE CALL FOR INGALLS.

HE MAY NOT BE RETURNED TO THE SENATE. The Republican Ticket Beaten in Kansas by the Farmers' Alliance With the Possible Exception of the Candidate for Governor. TOPEKA, Nov. 6.—The official count will be necessary to decide whether Willets, the alliance candidate for governor, or Humphrey, the republican candidate, has been elected. The vote is very close with indications in Willets' favor with most of the western counties where the farmers are in a majority to hear from.

The Farmers' alliance has elected beyond doubt W. A. Baker, its candidate for congress in the Fifth district, and contributed to the election of Moonlight, democrat, in the First, whose election is conceded by something over 1,000 majority. The alliance seems reasonably sure of electing at least one other congressional candidate—Simpson in the Seventh district. The district is composed of thirteen counties, mostly in the western part of the state and Simpson is running Hallowsell, republican, very close, and it will take the official count to determine who is successful. The Fifth district is also conceded to be very close.

In the fight between Davis, the Farmers' alliance, and Phillips, republican, seven counties out of ten in that district have reported. Of these Davis has carried four and Phillips three, majorities in all cases being very small and one county may change the result as it now appears to be.

The republicans have elected Thurston and Kelly beyond a doubt in the second and fourth districts respectively. An element of doubt still exists in the fourth district where Clover of the Farmers' alliance contests the re-election of Perkins, republican. The third district is also in doubt. Clover, state president of the Farmers' alliance, ran ahead of his ticket in the counties heard from, Perkins, (rep.) who is up for re-election, has very small majorities in four out of the seven counties heard from. Clover has carried three counties.

Late returns indicate almost the positive election of Ives, the Farmers' alliance candidate for state attorney general over Kellogg, (rep.) The democrat and re-submission vote was very heavy, but not so large as anticipated. Robinson, democrat, candidate for governor, was scratched for Willets, and the Farmers' alliance voted for democrats on the county votes.

LOD COLERIDGE STRICKEN.

The Chief Justice of England in a Critical Condition. LONDON, Nov. 6.—Much excitement was created in the Queen's bench division of the high court of justice to-day by the sudden illness of Lord Coleridge, lord chief justice of England. He had heard a case in his private room and though he had complained of feeling ill during the hearing, he was able to give a decision in the matter. Directly afterward he was seized with an apoplectic or paralytic stroke. The nearest doctor was hastily summoned and messengers were dispatched to Lord Coleridge's residence. Lady Coleridge proceeded instantly to the court to render what assistance she could to her stricken husband. The chief justice was placed upon an improvised couch in an ante-room and other doctors summoned, who declare his condition critical.

CAUSE OF THE ATTEMPT.

Two Letters Written by Joseph Suttle. A correspondent writing to the Concord Standard, of the attempted suicide of Jos. Suttle, of Asheville, at Wake Forest college, says: "There seems to be no adequate cause assignable except momentary insanity. However, he wrote two letters, one to the students, telling them that they were not the cause, another to his mother, in which he said he could not make the progress in his studies that he desired and that he doubted his call to the ministry and felt like his life would be a failure and he would rather die than make a failure. Previous to this time he had never seemed to suffer from any depression of spirits any more than is usual with young men on first entering college."

THE VOTE IN THE REST OF THE TOWNSHIPS. The Majority of the County Ticket—Crawford Sure of 1,000—Campbell Probably Defeated. The board of county canvassers from all the election precincts met in the court house to-day to receive the official count of the ballots. The vote as the official count shows is as follows: Crawford, 3,395; Ewart, 2,811; Campbell, 3,304; Sprinkle, 2,823; Reed, 3,390; Lowry, 3,282; Harris, 2,804; Folsom, 2,710; Reynolds, 3,274; Worley, 2,808; Mackey, 3,282; Brown, 2,806; Starnes, 3,202; Hamlet, 2,825; Courtney, 3,444; Pinkerton, 2,717; McBrayer, 3,375; Merriwether, 2,734. The remainder of the judicial ticket received about the same vote. Ewart's majority in Mitchell is about 900. Returns from other counties are scattered, but the election of Crawford by 1,000 majority is accepted as a fact. Campbell's majority in Buncombe is 479, but it is said that Sprinkle got a majority in Madison of 609 and is elected by 130.

RETURNS FROM HAYWOOD.

Big Democratic Victory in that County. WAYNESVILLE, Nov. 5.—[Special.]—All the townships in Haywood county have been heard from except Cattaaloochee and this will not give a majority either way of more than five to ten votes. All the townships are democratic but Clyde.

AFFAIRS OF CONSEQUENCE.

FOREIGN. Chief secretary for Ireland Balfour has gone on a tour over the routes of the proposed railways in Donegal, Ireland. An Italian in Glasgow, Scotland, was murdered on his wedding night by one of his countrymen, who was not invited to the ceremony. Owing to the mental condition of the king of Holland, who has been declared incapable of governing, the duke of Nassau will be regent of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. HOME. There was a good deal of excitement at the polls in Philadelphia and one man was shot. Mrs. Arzene Julian and her year old babe were burned to death at Bethlehem, Pa., Monday night, by the explosion of an ordinary kerosene lamp, which she carried in putting the baby to bed.
