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

THE IRISH FAMINE.

The Appeal to America With drawn for a Time at Lea NEW YORK, Nov. 10.-The American ommittee for the relief of the famine in Ireland have issued a public statement temporarily withdrawing its appeal to the

American people, because, it says, "there has been provided a promise at least, of the relief which will be adequate even to the dire nature of the distress which is at hand. The Brit-ish government has been spurred, first, to investigate, through its chief secretary for Ireland, the danger which threatened the lives of its people; and, second, to un-dertake a system of public works in the distressed districts which, by affording partial relief, will at least postpone the invasion of the demon of famine."
