## PANIC!

GREAT EXCITEMENT ON THE NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.

PRICES OF BEST STOCKS GO DOWN WITH A RUSH.

SOME RECOVERIES ARE MADE, BUT LOSSES ARE HEAVY.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Private cables received before the opening of the stock exchange announcing the troubles of the Baring Brothers and stating that the Bank of England, Rothschilds and other bankers had taken up the accounts of Baring Brothers amounting to \$75,000,000, creating a profound sensation. A conference of brokers was at once had and it was decided to have brokers in every stock that could be handled to bid advanced prices at the opening so as to avoid a sudden shock.

As a result prices for nearly all the active stocks opened 1/2 to 2 per cent. above last night's close, the extreme gain being made by Northern Pacific preferred. Then liquidation of the week's accounts set in in full force and prices gave way rapidly in all directions.

Wild excitement prevailed, stocks being thrown over in a most reckless manner and losses in the first hour of trading exceeded anything seen since the present decline began. The dealings were simply enormous and the rapidity with which the quotations melted away was something unprecedented, there being no halt in the downward movement.

At 11 a. m. a panic prevailed. Prices gave way in every direction and brokers were dismissed at the prospect.

Lackawanna, the favorite investment stock, led in the downward rush with a decline of 4 per cent. Atchafalaya went down to 24; Rock Island to 63 1/2, and sugar to 50, the lowest prices on record for those stocks. Canada Southern and other regular dividend payers were thrown over as well as were the speculative stocks.

After 11:15 there was a rally caused by the following cable from London: "A guarantee fund to Baring Bros. & Co. stated to amount to \$30,000,000 has been made, by various financial, banking and discount houses, guaranteeing their accounts. The crisis is over and the failure of the firm has been averted."

Vedder, Peabody & Co., who are agents here of Baring Bros. & Co., London, say they have private advices from London that whatever trouble there may have been there has been completely averted. The trouble was doubtless caused entirely by the depression in Argentine securities and the branch house here in New York is in no wise affected.

At 11:30 a better feeling prevailed and the market was stronger. The London market was comparatively quiet, the feeling being that the crisis was over, and American securities were a fraction higher where any change occurred from yesterday.

Noon—Money has been easy with no loans, but those offered at 5 and 6 per cent. The market after 11 o'clock was influenced for the better by dispatches from London which placed a somewhat better face upon the troubles there and prices in this market went but little further in the downward direction. The recovery which followed was very irregular but amounted to as much as 10 per cent. Lackawanna, while many stocks were again brought up to near the opening figures. The close was still very active, but with less excitement and unsettled at material losses for the day.

AT BOSTON. Boston, Nov. 15.—Kidder, Peabody & Co., said today that there need be no anxiety on the part of creditors of the London firm of Baring Brothers, as their assets exceed their liabilities by as much as \$200,000,000. They are virtually carrying the Argentine Republic loan and taking back holdings of those distressed customers to whom they had sold any part thereof.

IN LONDON. London, Nov. 15.—The Times, referring to the financial situation says: "The city has passed through a crisis verging upon a panic. Such a time has not been known since the suspension of convertibility of the gold standard, and we are able to announce that the worst is over. The bank of England has added to its historic services to the state and the commercial community by its prompt action in averting what would have been a lamentable catastrophe. The administration of the bank has not only provided vast reinforcements to its stock of gold to meet exceptional demands in the event of a panic, but also steps to prevent the ordinary routine of business to a large number of small but important firms."

Weekly Cotton Report. New York, Nov. 15.—The total visible supply of cotton for the world is 2,623,029 bales, of which 2,124,229 is American against 2,394,173 and 2,030,373 respectively last year. Receipts of cotton this week at all interior towns, 219,371; receipts at plantations, 313,604; crop in sight, 3,204,954.

Two More Democrats. Detroit, Nov. 16.—The struggle in the eighth and ninth congressional districts closed last night. In the ninth Judge Wheeler (dem.) has 63 majority over Catehoun. In the eighth district Henry A. Youmans (dem.) has 91 majority over Elias (rep.).

## POWDERLY'S ORDER.

The Knights of Labor Session at Denver.

DENVER, Nov. 15.—The Knights of Labor took up the entire session yesterday in considering the report of the committee on laws. This work will probably be concluded to-day when the more important questions will be brought before the assembly. Little has been said regarding candidates for the various offices that are to be chosen at this meeting, but there appears to be a general feeling that there will be no opposition made to Powderly's election as general master workman. Some prominent knights are consulting as to the advisability of the knights entering into politics.

## THE CONSUMPTIVE CURE.

EARLY TREATMENT IS NECESSARY.

Whether Dr. Koch's Remedy Will Effect a Final Cure Has Not Yet Been Proved.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—The article of Prof. Koch in this week's number of the German Medical Weekly says that he is, as yet, unprepared to indicate the source from which the curative matter is derived, and neither is he ready to explain the method of preparation. The reason he gives is that the experimental work has not yet been brought to completion. He states, however, that the curative lymph itself can now be obtained from Dr. Libbertz, whose address is No. 28 Laueberger Strasse, Berlin.

The lymph must be applied subcutaneously by means of a valvular syringe.

Prof. Koch expresses the belief that his remedy will prove a cure for incipient phthisis. Whether, however, the cure will be final and definite has not, he says, been clearly proved. In all cases Koch emphasizes the necessity of early treatment, as only in incipient stages of the disease, he declares, can the remedy fully develop its efficacy.

## A MISSION AT TRINITY.

It Will Begin December First and Last Ten Days.

An open letter, signed by Rev. McNeely Duffoss, rector of Trinity church and of which the following is a part has been sent to the members of Trinity church and others in the city: "On Sunday December 1st, we propose, with God's help, to commence a mission lasting ten days. The mission is a course of services and meetings, in which a special effort is made to awaken souls; that those who are in sin may forsake it and turn to the Lord, and that those who have already sought Him may be stirred up to greater devotion and diligence. We invite you to come to this mission. It is free to every one. If you know any friend or neighbor, to whom you think it may do good, invite him or her to come with you."

## FIRE CHIEF'S MEET.

Mr. J. P. Sawyer of Asheville Made Chairman.

Mr. J. P. Sawyer, chief of the Asheville fire department returned last night from Greensboro where he has been attending the state meeting of fire chiefs. Mr. Sawyer was made chairman of the convention which met Wednesday.

One of the chief things done by the meeting was the adoption of a resolution to petition the state legislature to appropriate a portion of the money received from fire insurance companies doing business in the state, to pay the volunteer fire companies of North Carolina.

The next session will be held at Durham in May, 1891, in connection with the annual meeting of the firemen's association.

## TO CONTEST THE ELECTION.

Mr. J. M. Campbell Gives Notice to That Effect.

Sheriff Reynolds of this county and Sheriff Chandler of Madison met here yesterday to canvass the vote of the two counties for state senator. The result gave Sprinkle, the republican candidate a majority of 130 over Campbell.

Mr. Campbell notified the sheriffs that he would contest the election. He has filed notices to Limestone, Ivy and Sandy Mush townships in this county and to a number of townships in Madison because of irregularities.

## "THE GALLEY SLAVE."

To be Rendered at the Grand Opera House Monday Night.

## THIS MEANS BUSINESS.

It is understood that the Oxford Land, Improvement and Manufacturing Company's new \$100,000 cotton factory will be located in about the center of South Oxford.

"High Point Enterprise: We hear some talk of a large cotton factory being erected here. Property that sold here for \$150 six years ago is now hard to obtain for \$1,000.

Oxford Day: Ten thousand dollars worth of stock in the cotton factory of the Oxford land improvement and manufacturing company has been sold to people in the city in past week.

Mr. Cuthbert, of Des Moines, Ia., was in town the first of the week looking for timber land. He represents a company that wants to secure 25,000 acres of good timber land in one body.—Murphy Scout.

Winston Daily: From the information we can gather there are bright prospects for one or two cotton factories being built here next year. Besides this several other enterprises are on the eve of being started.

## IS MR. PARNELL GUILTY?

A GREAT SENSATION IN LONDON TO-DAY.

In the O'Shea Divorce Case Mr. Parnell Does Not Appear and Mrs. O'Shea Makes no Defence.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The trial of the O'Shea divorce case, in which Parnell is co-respondent, opened this morning. A large audience was present. Justice Butt presided. A special jury had been empanelled to try the case. Clark, Interwick and Lewis appeared for Capt. O'Shea, the plaintiff; Lockwood & Pritchard for Mrs. O'Shea, respondent, and McCall for Mrs. Steele Stormers O'Shea against whom there is a counter charge of criminal intimacy with Capt. O'Shea.

Mr. Parnell, as co-respondent, was not represented by counsel.

Capt. O'Shea was the only prominent figure present. Mrs. O'Shea's counsel said he did not intend to cross-examine any witness or call any witness in behalf of Mrs. O'Shea or take any part in the proceedings.

This collapse of the defense has caused an immense sensation and involves compelling Mr. Parnell to pay the costs.

The Dublin Express says that Parnell has informed several of the most prominent men in the Irish parliamentary party that he will not lead the party in parliament during the coming session.
