## A SCARCITY OF MONEY.

THE TIMIDITY OF LONDONERS: THE CAUSE OF IT.

A \$1,000,000 Failure on the Stock Exchange, New York, This Morning—Market Irregular.

New York, Nov. 18, 10:45.—The failure of Guyanet & Co. has just been announced on the stock exchange. The firm made an assignment to C. Elliott Miner. The assignee states that the liabilities amount to about \$1,000,000. The failure was due to the action of several banks in calling in loans to the firm.

The preferences are \$40,000 to Margaret E. Galland and \$60,000 to Frazier & Minor, their attorneys.

The Evening Post's financial article says:

The stock market during the forenoon was still irregular and unsettled, both here and in London as it was yesterday. There is a great deal of arbitrary business owing to the great differences in prices of the same stocks in the two markets. Money was quoted at 5 to 5 1/2 in London for bankers' balances, but in the present condition of finances we must assume that this is largely nominal. The scarcity of money in this market owing to the timidity of the Londoners is now the most important factor in the market.

**GREAT VITALITY.**

A Man Lives With His Head Half Off.

BIRMINGHAM, Nov. 18.—Yesterday afternoon at Crispwell, thirty miles from here on the Coosa river, Buck Freeman, an employe at Wilder & Hull's saw mill, fell on a saw and his head was cut through from the crown to the midway of the nose, cutting out clots of the brain. Freeman did not lose consciousness, and three hours afterward was still alive and talking clearly. He is about 60 years of age.

**THE GEORGIA SENATORSHIP.**

Voting Begins This P. M.—Two Candidates.

ATLANTA, Nov. 18.—Atlanta and all Georgia is red hot over the senatorial situation. The balloting begins this afternoon. The two prominent candidates are Gen. John B. Gordon and Mr. Pat Callahan. Gordon, as is well known, took strong grounds against the southern bill—and that won for him the opposition of the alliance. Callahan from all parts of the state are protesting against Callahan because of his connection with a great railroad monopoly and these protests have been strong enough to make legislators everywhere of being opposed to Callahan even stronger than to Gordon.

**No Cause for Alarm.**

HYDROS, S. D., Nov. 18.—Gen. Ruger, commander in the department of Dakota, U. S. A., and Lieut. Woodruff arrived here on their way to St. Paul from a visit to Fort Sully, Randall and Bennett. They report having found the Indians very quiet, and although there is much interest manifested regarding the coming of the Messiah, there is no occasion for alarm.

**A Loss of Over \$100,000.**

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 18.—Fire last night destroyed the plant of the East Florida land and produce company in Buenos Esmeralda, a suburb of St. Augustine, together with 1,500,000 feet of lumber. The loss is estimated at over \$100,000.

**E. B. Stahman Resigns.**

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 18.—Col. E. B. Stahman, third lieutenant of the Louisville and Nashville railroad, has tendered his resignation and it has been accepted. His successor will be Judge W. J. Woods, of Evansville.

## COMMENTS OF THE LONDON PRESS ON PARNELL'S FALL.

HE MUST CEASE TO BE THE NATIONALISTS' LEADER.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The provincial newspapers join in the chorus of denunciation of Parnell.

The Dundee Advertiser (Whistonian) says that the spectacle of Parnell's sneaking out of bed doors and sliding down fire escapes is contemptible and pitiable, and that he ought, for a time, to retire to private life, as the Liberal party will prevent any attempt to bring it out.

The Glasgow papers in many cases advise temporary self-denial.

The London Daily Chronicle says: "It is deplorable that it should have wrecked his career and destroyed his public usefulness merely to create a party passion. How can a capable Irish leader such as Parnell? The middle-class electors in England will certainly resist any appeal, even by tabernacle, to support the party led by Parnell."

The Daily News says: "The Unionists appear to hope that the discredit that has descended upon Parnell will cling to the Irish party and the Irish cause, but political principles and parties are independent of accidents to individuals. Even should the present and leader step aside, there are others who will take his place, and the anticipation of danger to the Home Rule cause will be disappointed."

The Daily Telegraph publishes Parnell's political opinions and says that he must cease for the present, at least, to lead the nationalist party. It is reported that the followers of Parnell do not desire him to retire, unless he wishes, in which case, the leadership will be vested in a commission of which Justin McKerrill will be president.

DUBLIN, Nov. 18.—The London correspondent of the Freeman's Journal declares that Parnell has not the slightest intention of resigning either the leadership of the nationalist party, or his duties in parliament.

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
