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A ROTTEN GRAND STAND.

TWOTHOUSAND PEOPLE FALL WITH IT.

At Least Fifty Men and Women Were Injured. None of Them Fatally, It is Believed.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Nov. 28.—A terrible accident occurred on the foot ball grounds at Eastern Park, Brooklyn, yesterday, before the Yale-Princeton game began. The big free stand on the eastern side of the grounds, the farthest from the grand stand collapsed, carrying down more than 2,000 people.

A scene of indescribable confusion and panic followed the crash. Screams and shrieks which came from the unfortunate were heartrending to hear. Many fainted from the injuries received.

A score or more policemen were soon engaged in pulling the maimed and wounded from the wreck. Others lent their assistance and within ten minutes the whole place had been cleared. A great many persons were very severely hurt and broken limbs and bruised heads and bodies were numerous. The lowest estimate puts the number of people injured at fifty, while others place it as high as sixty or more.

The stands were evidently in an unsafe condition, as the broken timbers showed that many of them were nearly rotted in two, while the whole structure was the most flimsy affair imaginable.

PARNELL FOOLS HIMSELF. MIMICREPRESENTS THE MOVEMENT FOR HIS EXPULSION.

Says It is Because He Supported the Royal Grants Last Summer—A Political Crisis On.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—A close friend of Parnell has declared that Parnell regards the movement to expel him from the leadership of the nationalist party as the radical party's revenge for his support of the royal grants last summer. He says that this view of the case can be supported by documentary evidence. This friend considers that the Irish party, if resolved into its elements, would have no cohesion. Gladstone, he says, has had his revenge on the man he imprisoned in Kilmahain jail and who later compelled the liberal leader to consider the demands of the Irish people. The next against Parnell's leadership, the friend declares, was carefully planned.

The Star (home rule) opposes the Irish land bill introduced in the house of commons last night. The measure, the Star says, is based upon fraud and is sure to end in disaster.

Lord Randolph Churchill is hurrying to London from Italy believing that the present crisis in political affairs will hasten the destruction of parliament.

THE WESTERN CONFERENCE. What Was Done at the Opening of the Session.

From the Raleigh Chronicle. The first session of the new Western North Carolina conference was called to order Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock by the venerable Bishop John C. Keener, at Concord. There is a large attendance and the meeting together for the first time of the ministers and laymen from Western North Carolina, who have heretofore been divided into two bodies, is an occasion of deep interest.

The day was spent in organization, and committees were appointed. The names of those applying to preach are: W. S. C. Cherry, W. M. Curtis, J. T. Crocker, H. T. Hoover, W. H. Perry, E. E. Parker, J. M. Rice, W. L. Sherrill, R. D. Sherrill, F. S. Starrett, J. B. Tarleton.

In May of this year, at the general conference of the church, in St. Louis, the North Carolina conference was divided into two conferences, and all that portion of North Carolina, including Asheville and all the far west, in the Holston conference was transferred to the Western conference. It starts with large territory, strong preachers, a large and wealthy membership, and will in a few years be the wealthiest conference in the Southern Methodist church.

THE INDIAN EXCITEMENT. The Ghost Dancers Receive Considerable Accessions.

WICHITA, Kan., Nov. 28.—Reports from Ft. Reno tell of greatly increased excitement among the ghost dancers and considerable accessions to their ranks, especially from among the Kiowas and Apaches.

HEAVY SNOW STORM. Railway Traffic Interfered With Seriously.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—A heavy snow storm prevails throughout England. The fall is so heavy as to seriously delay traffic on the railways.

V. M. C. A. Anniversary. The thanksgiving services at the V. M. C. A. last night were also the celebration of the anniversary of the first public meeting held in the rooms, a year ago.

Death of J. M. Wise. RICHMOND, Nov. 28.—James M. Wise, the wellknown tobaccoist, and nephew of ex-Governor Henry A. Wise and brother of Congressman George D. Wise, died this morning.

Will Not Be a Party to Fraud. DOVER, N. H., Nov. 28.—George Dickey, clerk of the New Hampshire legislature, has forwarded his resignation to Gov. Goodell.

Edward Litton Dead. DUBLIN, Nov. 28.—Edward Falconer Litton, M. A., Q. C., one of the commissioners under the land act of 1881, is dead.

A THANKSGIVING SERMON.

REV. W. S. P. BRYAN AT THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The Blessings That Have Come to the Nation and to the South—Trusts and Combinations—The Negro Problem.

Rev. W. S. P. Bryan, the pastor, conducted the Thanksgiving services at the First Presbyterian church yesterday morning and preached an interesting sermon on the advancement of the south. His text was:

Let the people praise Thee, O God: let all the people praise Thee. O let the nations be glad and sing for joy: for Thou shalt judge the people righteously, and govern the nations upon earth. Psalms LXVII 3-4.

"The power of uttering God's praise distinguishes the man from the brute," he said; "the habit of uttering that praise distinguishes the devout man from the scornful man. Gratitude is a fitting measure of piety."

"The text, however, summons us to praise in a special relation. Other passages address the individual believer, the congregation of the righteous and the house of Israel; but here 'the people,' 'the nations' are called to God's praise. What then have we as a nation to be thankful for?"

BLESSINGS AS A NATION. "Apart from the general blessings this year has been marked by three special ones—one is the defeat of the lottery. The veto of Gov. McInery, the wise and thoughtful declaration of our congress and the recent action of the Adams Express company will effectually defeat the corrupting influence of this shameful business."

Another is the surrender of Mormonism. The declaration of submission to the laws of congress by President Woodruff has been endorsed by the Mormon conference and polygamy in the language of Utah's governor, 'is dead beyond resurrection.'

The other is, 'The revival of patriotism.' Patriotism is something more than Fourth of July enthusiasm; certainly something more than the triumph of any political party. It is a lofty and disinterested spirit which rises above party advantage in its zeal for the public good and which employs parties only so far as they are instruments of national welfare. There was a time not long ago when the patriot seemed to be less in the nation than he is now and the loss of power appeared to take the place long held in the history of our country by a noble and honorable political activity; when sectional issues were mooted in order that private gain might be made out of a divided country, and when dishonest and treacherous men were able to hold their places despite the protests of the upright. It was a time when the political future looked dark indeed and when the prophets saw signs of national decay.

"But a change has taken place. The political atmosphere is purer and the clouds have lifted. When men cast their votes not according to party lines but consistently with certain principles which they heretofore held; when they rise superior to the bribes offered directly and indirectly; when they recognize the length and breadth of their country and feel a confidence in, a sympathy for and a kinship with their brethren in other sections; when they hurl from power the thief and the trickster, whatever his politics be; when they throttle the monopoly that seeks to prostitute political virtue to its own sordid ends and drive men like sheep by their heels; when there is a revival of patriotism, a quickening of political responsibility in the consciences of the people, a return of the robust and virile public spirit which animated our fathers and moulded the institutions which we have inherited from them. In this case, patriotism is higher than partisanship and it is patriotism that rejoices. For this let us bless the God of nations."

BLESSINGS ON THE SOUTH. "The material improvement of our beloved land has been constant and substantial. Unfortunately the figures of the country at large have not yet been completed in the census office and we must be content with general statements. The figures for the twelve southern states, however, are at hand gathered from the reports of the auditors and governors, and are reliable. They show that the actual wealth of the south this year is \$1,158,700,000, an increase of \$5,344,000 in 1889, which is an increase of 100 per cent. in ten years. This wealth distributed equally would give to every man \$652.11 as against \$385.62 in 1880.

"The total indebtedness of the south, state, county municipal is \$182,426,565, a decrease since 1880 of \$35,267,000. "The average taxation is 4.03 as against 4.60 in 1880, a decrease of over half a cent. The revenue of the different states aggregates \$20,312,739, an increase of 53.3 per cent. The banking capital is \$172,425,000, an increase of 64.5 per cent. The school revenue is \$13,636,299, an increase of 126.9 per cent and the number of pupils enrolled is 3,242,286, an increase of 61.1 per cent.

There are 55,931 manufacturing establishments in the south as against 34,563 in 1880, their products amounting to \$675,332,000, an increase over 1880 of more than 100 per cent.

"What is the meaning of these fabulous figures? They mean for one thing that the south is equal in resources to any section of the country, that where for a century our fathers were content to till the ground for cotton and corn and tobacco in industrial dependence upon remote sections, their sons have gone under the soil and found riches that are attracting the interest of the industrial world and making the south a source of supplies instead of a mere market for supplies. Surely the earth has yielded her increase in a way unexpected to our fathers and God has blessed us abundantly."

WHAT THOSE FIGURES MEAN. "The figures also mean that the sons of the south have grandly risen to their grand opportunities. The taint that the southern man makes a good politician but a poor business man has been proven groundless by the experience of the past decade. The poverty which followed the war was God's blessing in disguise, for it threw our young men upon themselves; it taxed their resources and stimulated their invention. The foremost men of the south to-day are the native sons of the south who are proving themselves the equals of the men of any section in shrewdness, in enterprise, in executive ability, and as the venerable fathers and the white-haired southern look on the new life which their sons are
