VERY IMPORTANT WORK OF THE NATIONAL ALLIANCE.

GEN. VANCE INTRODUCES A RES-OLUTION OF INTEREST HERE.

OCALA, Pla., Dec. 5 .- In the allians onvention General R. B. Vance, of North Carolina, offered a resolution, which was passed, providing for the appointment of one delegate from each state to attend an inter-state convention at Asheville, N.C. December 17. No expenses wert allowe the delegates from the treasury.

Mr. Vance also offered a resolution calling upon the state and national legislatures to reduce the salaries of public officers to more moderate sums. This was referred to the committee on legisla

Alliance delegates J. H. Rice and Jno Davis, of Kansas, in connection with one or two others are working upon a call for a national convention to form a new party, the date being fixed at February 23, 1891, and the place Cincinnati. The call will invite delegates from the national Farmers alliance and all other na-tional organizations in sympathy with it or which indorse the St. Louis plat-form as well as the editors of the reform press throughout the country, to take Mr. Davis said, when asked if the call touched on other measures of public pol-

cy:
"Yes, it lays down four propositions
with reference to national reform, viz.
finance, transportation, land and labor.
then this the contents of the hunner, transportation, land and labor. Further than this, the contents of the call are not for the public as yet. The call will not be presented to the National alliance for endorsement, but will be circulated for signatures in thirty-six alliance states and perhaps in all the states of the union. The convention will undoubtedly be largely attended and will result in placing a presidential ticket.

Apropos of the third-party movement, there is said to be a strong feeling among national alliance men here in favor of a general consolidation of all similar national loddes.

At the morning session of the Farmers' alliance Messrs. Holden, Williams and Rice, of Kansas, representing the Citizen's alliance of that state, asking for a committee of conference to arrange for closer relations between the Citizen's alliance and the National alliance. The request was granted and a committee appointed. was granted and a committee appointed. The colored alliance is unanimous in demanding the organization of a third party. The colored alliance, according to the reports of its officers, has a mem-bership of 1,200,000 and of these 750,-000 are legal voters. They are all in-cluded in the Farmer's alliance's claim of total membership of more than 3,000. a total membership of more than 3,000, 000. Col. R. F. Humphrey, the president of the colored alliance, and the other del-egates unite in declaring that the alliance egates unite in declaring that the alliance negroes of the south are unanimous in trepudiating their allegiance to the republican party and in demanding a new party and new measures and new issues.

Co. Humphey, the head of the negrogalliance, is a white man, and the only one in the organization. He was formerly a Baptist preacher in Texas, and be devoted many years to missionary work among the colored people. When the negrogalliance movement was begun, two or three years ago, the members insisted on his taking charge of it and remaining at at its head. He has the unbounded confidence of every man in it. Probably no man in America stands in such close relations with the negro race and is so well posted about their condition and sentiments. He said to a New York Sun correspondent.

"From the inception of the alliance movement among the negroes, they have been in favor of a new political party. In the last election the negroes of the south did not vote except in South Caro-lina; there they regarded the Tillman campaign as a third party movement.
