HAD TO BE SLAUGHTERED.

DETAILS OF THE TERRIBLE FIGHT AT WOUNDED KNEE.

THE TREACHEROUS INDIANS FIRE ON THE TROOPS AND THE LATTER IN TURN REVENGE THE KILLING OF THEIR COMRADES.

OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 31.—Further details of the attempt of Big Foot to slay the soldiers who had captured them are as follows:

The Indians who were being disarmed were giving up their arms and suddenly observing the treachery of this method of procedure, Major Whitesides ordered a detachment of troops to enter the tepees and search them. Just then 120 desperate Indians turned upon the soldiers who were gathered closely about the tepees and immediately a storm of fire was poured upon the military.

The first fire was terribly disastrous to the soldiers. The reply was most terrible, and in an instant the broad in which the Indian camp was set was smoke-strewn Vesuvius.

The soldiers, maddened at the sight of their falling comrades, hardly waited the command and in a moment the whole front was a sheet of fire, above which the smoke rolled, obscuring the central scene from view.

Through this horrible curtain a single Indian could be seen at times flying before the fire, but after the first discharge from the carbines of the troops there were but few of them left. They fell on all sides like grain in the course of a scythe.

At the conclusion of the address the doors of the large building had been thrown open and remitted.

The refreshments were served by the young ladies of the college, and bewitching waitresses who made with their up-swept and flowing white caps.

The remainder of the evening, until 11 o'clock, was absolutely spent in conversation, and all present voted in one of the most unanimous resolutions ever known in the Central Methodist church.
